History Volunteers Turn Out Thursday

Nearly 50 people showed up at the historic Mead Building on Thursday night as volunteers to help explain the Historic Preservation Ordinance that will be on the November ballot in Yankton County.

'We would have been happy with a 10 or 20," said Bernie Hunhoff, chair of the Historic Preservation Commission that asked the county commission to place the ordinance on the ballot. "The turnout and the enthusiasm are encouraging signs of the support for saving the Mead Building and preserving our heritage and history.'

The volunteers learned about the benefits of the project. Crystal Nelson, director of the Dakota Territorial Museum, reported that nearly half of the \$4.7 million project has already been committed. She noted that a show of public support at the November election will help to raise still more funds from big donors and from foundations

who provide grants. Governor Dennis Daugaard recently toured the facility to check on the progress and was pleasantly surprised at all the work that has been accomplished.

Jim Means, vice chair of the preservation commission, explained that a "yes" vote will not raise taxes for property owners because the mill levy being requested for historic preservation must fit within the county's current spending limits. "The county is already appropriating most of this money to the museum and the increases will come from natural growth in the county.'

Means said it will be a tiny part of the county's budget but will allow the museum to have predictable public support. "This will help with our fundraising and it helps us budget for several years out.'

Hunhoff told the volunteers that the Mead Building will provide space for a children's museum, exhibits on the Missouri River and the legacy of the community's caring for the mentally ill, among other things. "It will also give us space to explain to youth the importance of our agricultural heritage. Kids today hardly know where their milk and eggs come from. Farming is critically important to our region and we need to explain that to our youth and our visi-

"No other community in the West will have a museum like this," he said. "Not Deadwood, Not Pierre, Not Sioux Falls and not Omaha. It will be a destination for travelers and an asset to our county for many generations to come. And the vast majority of the funding will come from private donors and

The 50 volunteers will help to explain the project to friends and neighbors. Another volunteer meeting will be held Oct. 16 at 7 p.m. at the GAR Hall.

Clifton said there will be other benefits to the community as well from the influx of new workers.

"It's going to be a plus for the community because of the additional people we're going to employ, additional revenue that will come into the city through the salaries that we'll be paying these people," he said. "And it's going to be done in conjunction with other projects such as the Workforce Development Initiative that's going on that Sapa's been heavily involved in attracting new workers to Yankton. It coincides with the housing study and housing development project the city is working on to get more housing.


