Coyotes aren't exactly about to run 75 percent of the time in Missoula. A year ago, USD passed 45 times,

and even with sophomore Ryan Saeger in at quarterback (in place of injured Kevin Earl), the Coyotes will still open things up, Glenn said.

"Balance is the key," he said. "But we want to keep the ball and protect our defense.

'This will be a battle," he added. times and sacked four times. "I think our kids believe we belong, but we just can't give up a bunch of big <u>p</u>lays.'

That was exactly what happened a year against the Grizzlies.

In a game played in Vermillion, Montana returned a fumble for a touchdown and later, following a Coyote go-ahead touchdown, returned a kickoff 98 yards for the game-winning score with under two minutes remaining.

'That's just horrible to lose like that," Glenn said.

Montana (1-1) will return quarterback Jordan Johnson for tonight's game, after he missed last week following a concussion. A year ago in Vermillion, he passed for 337 yards, but was intercepted three

Ultimately, though, his Grizzlies left South Dakota with a 31-27 vic-

tory.
"That was a fun game, but they made bigger plays at the end," Huffer said. "We're ready this year, and excited to get them again."

Much like USD, Montana will be playing its first FCS game of the season tonight. The Grizzlies, though, have the advantage of playing at home — where they beat the Coyotes two years ago.

That stadium is loud and rowdy, but you have to concentrate on the game and get it done," Huffer said.
