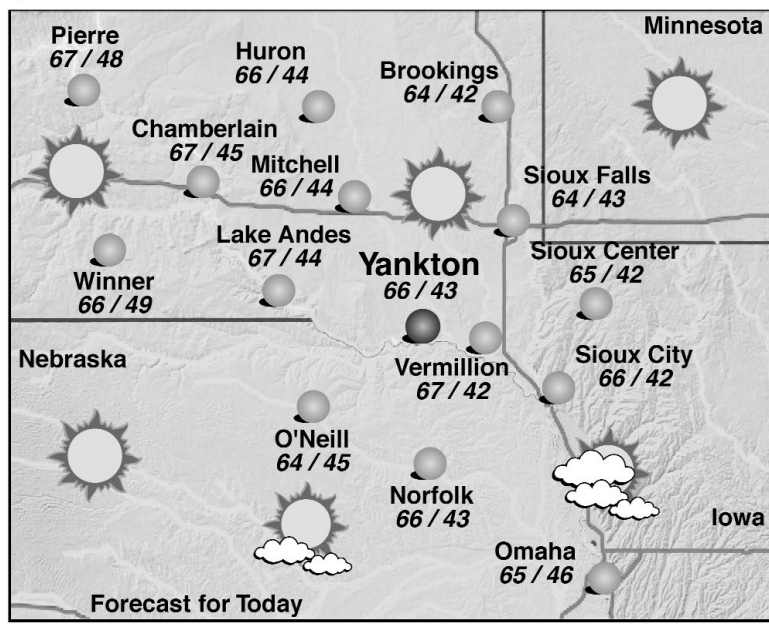

James River Water District Awards \$187K In Assistance

HURON — Chairman Randy Stanley of Grotton announced that the James River Water Development District awarded \$187,618.18 in cost-sharing assistance at their recent Board of Directors meeting held in Aberdeen on Thursday, Sept. 11.

The District awarded \$150,000 to Brown County to replace the existing floodgate structure where Crow Creek flows into the James River. The structure is in poor shape with only two of the four floodgates functioning properly. The existing floodgate was constructed approximately in 1911 and due to the age of the structure, replacement parts are not available. This project will replace the existing floodgate structure in the same place and with the same size water-flow capacity.

The district also awarded \$13,500 to a landowner in Kassel Township in Hutchinson County, for repairs to an existing dam a half-mile northeast of Menno Lake.

The dam has a small holding pond for silt retention.

The district awarded \$4,118.18 to a landowner in Jamesville Township in Yankton County, for repairs to an existing dam with a drainage area more than 280 acres.

The district also awarded \$20,000 to Yankton County Highway Department to replace a culvert on Mud Creek in Walshtown Township. The original culvert was washed out due to a large rain event.

In other business, the board approved their 2015 operations budget in the amount of \$965,593. Prior to the budget being approved, the District held their public hearing for the 2015 operations budget. No written or public comments were received in regards to the 2015 operations budget. For the fourth year in a row, the District will not increase its tax request. The District will ask for \$958,893

in property taxes, the same level as in 2012, 2013 and 2014.

The district approved a new Earth Dam Program in which they may offer up to 75 percent cost-share on building and/or repairing of earth dams within the District. The District also initiated a 75 percent up front enhancement payment for certain Conservation Reserve Programs. The JRWDD Enhanced RPT Program can be utilized with CP8A (Grassed Waterways), CP30 (Marginal Pastureland Wetland Buffer), CP29 (Marginal Pastureland Wildlife Habitat Buffer), CP22 (Riparian Buffer, and CP 21 (Filter Strips).

Members of Cottonwood Lake Association, Upper Crow Creek Watershed District and Brown County Mud Creek Watershed District provided updates on their activities and projects to the James River Water Development District Board.

Crest Road Will Be Closed Next Two Days

Crest Road, the road that crosses the Gavins Point Dam will be closed from 8 a.m. today (Monday) through 3:30 p.m. Tuesday, Sept. 16. This closure will include nighttime hours.

The public is asked to plan on an alternate route of travel during this time.

The closure is a result of the inspection, repair and painting of the spillway gates. There will be periodic closures throughout duration of the construction, which will continue into the fall.

Notice Of Meridian Bridge Closure Area

The City of Yankton reminds the community that the Meridian Bridge Plaza, the area to the north of Levee St. and south of Second St. at the south end of Walnut, will be closed to the general public once the construction begins on the plaza.

The trail connections to the upper level of the bridge, and the trail connection leading south to the lower level of the bridge, will be closed due to the construction and citizens should not enter the construction zone areas as these areas are blocked off by fences and barriers.

For the safety of everyone, the blocked off areas should not be entered by the general public.

Absentee Ballot Voting Begins Sept. 19

Yankton County Auditor Patty Hojem says the Auditor's office will begin assisting voters with absentee voting on Friday, Sept. 19.

There are two ways to vote absentee, says Hojem. Registered voters can vote in person at the Auditor's office, and they need to bring a driver's license or other photo identification. In order to vote by mail, citizens must fill out an application and provide a

copy of photo identification or have their signature notarized.

Those residing overseas or members of the military can request an absentee ballot by fax or e-mail. However, those in the military who live in the states must have their application notarized or provide a copy of photo identification. Any person overseas or in the military can receive their ballot electronically. Hojem says the voter registration deadline

is Oct. 20 and that people can stop in to both register and vote absentee.

Absentee voting is available until election day, Nov. 4. However, those in the hospital or who are confined to their homes can vote absentee by messenger on election day until 3 p.m. People who need rides to the polls (or need an absentee application brought to the hospital or home) generally call either the local

Democratic (605-6602144) or Republican (605-260-0453) parties to seek assistance.

Hojem says sample ballots are available and the Auditor's Office is open normal hours (9 a.m. to 5 p.m.) throughout the election season.

they're learning here because a lot of parents don't get around to doing it," he said. "There's a lot of single parents out there, too, that might not have the opportunity, the understanding or the knowledge to teach the kids about guns or bows or how to set up duck hunting, so the kids get exposed to, and educated on, things that I think are critical for quality of life, critical for environmental awareness, critical for self-esteem and independence and individualism."

Nugent does four camps each year in Iowa, Nebraska, Colorado and South Dakota.

He added that he fields requests for additional camps, but a desire to make each event the highest quality possible has made Nugent hesitant to expand further.

"Amazingly, on many levels, we're

bombarded with requests to do them in all 50 states and all across Canada," he said. "But because it has my name attached to it, I've got to be very hands-on in scrutinizing and vetting everybody who does volunteer. ... I trust (Cull and the leaders of the other hosting organizations) to pick reliable, responsible, capable, professional and knowledgeable volunteers to teach the activities because that's very critical. If the kids are going to be taught how to handle a shotgun, it better be a world-class master shotgunning teaching them that — and same with all the other things as well. We have world-class masters in every activity teaching the kids, so it's not like we have to worry whether they're getting the right lessons or not."

Cull said the camp is a great boost to the NFAA's mission as well.

"Our mission is archery and, of course, archery is a big part of outdoors and shooting projectiles of any sort," he said. "Our forte is tournament archery, and bow hunting goes back to

our roots. To go full circle again makes it really nice to see us expand with this. It's going to help expand our bow hunting programs and it's a great shot in the arm for all of us."

Following the day of activities, Nugent addressed all the participants and volunteers, leaving them with some words of advice.

"These people really, really love you," he said. "They want you to have a wonderful quality of life and a great American dream. We think the ultimate quality of life and the ultimate American dream starts with the outdoor lifestyle and starts with the freedoms that are unique in America. ... Take (the kids) in the woods. Get them to 'aim small, miss small' like they were taught here today. It could be — and I believe it will be — a foundation to make America great again."

a beautiful hiking trail.'

Smith said an additional benefit for hikers is that this is such a highly preserved area for hikers to use.

Brian Korman, lead biological technician with the MNRR,

said the woodland-based trail gives people a new perspective on the park, which stretches from Ft. Randall Dam to Ponca State Park.

'It adds another opportunity for people to get out and enjoy the public land that the park has to offer for them,' Korman said. 'It's a little bit of a different experience than other areas would have in more developed areas for hiking trails.'

Smith said he doesn't anticipate expansion on the trail system at Mulberry Bend beyond this.

'I think this spot has been developed about as much as we want to,' he said. 'We'll see as the trail develops along how much we have to change it to make it more accessible.'

From here, the park NPS will be gearing up for an environmental assessment

project in 2015 in which they'll seek public input for how to further develop areas along the MNRR, including Mulberry Bend. Input could be sought as early as this fall.
