Female Kicker Fitting In For GV

GAYVILLE — Number eleven. Bailey Gale. Kicker. 5foot-2. 140 pounds. Junior.

That's how Bailey Gale is listed on the Gayville-Volin football roster.

Thing is, Gale is a she. A soccer player turned kicker, the 16-year-old isn't the first girl to play varsity football — nor will she be the last — but that wasn't her intent, she maintains.

"Kicking for a football team was definitely the next thing to keep me going down that same road," Gale said during an interview Monday in Gayville.

Down what road? Gale, who lives in Vermillion but open-enrolls at Gayville-Volin High School, had been playing club soccer in her home town, but when the Vermillion School District — like many others across the state — sanctioned soccer beginning with the 2014-15 school year, she was ineligible to play for the Tan-

agers.
"Me and a couple other girls were left to figure something out," she said.

Already a student at Gayville-Volin, Gale approached football coach Patrick Beeman. She wanted to try kicking for the Raiders.

"At first, I wanted to do kickoffs," Gale said. "But then I thought, 'Wait, I don't want to get smashed.'

Gale isn't simply a name or a number on a roster. Or even just a kicker. She's already proven to be an offensive weapon for the Raiders, according to her teammates.

Through two games, Gale has made 5-of-8 extra points — she was 4-of-5 in last Friday night's 55-0 homecoming victory over Tripp-Delmont-

Although one of her eight attempts was blocked (the timing has been a work in progress), the Raiders remain confident in the ability to use a rare position at their level: Place-kicker.

"Not too many nine-man teams can say that," senior Brandon VanOsdel said Monday. "And even fewer can say they're going to have a girl kick field goals."

Girl Among Boys

The only characteristic that distinguishes Gale as a girl during games would be her small 5-foot-2 frame, as well as the long pony tail that sticks out from underneath her helmet.

When the time comes for her to kick an extra point, it's all business.

'You know when she's behind you kicking, that you want to block those guys with everything you've got,"

VanOsdel said. "It's kind of a

pride thing, too."
To that end, Gale isn't just a girl who happens to be on the team. She's a teammate. She's one of the guys, according to her coach.

"She's accepted by them," said coach Beeman, whose Raiders (2-0) play Burke-South Central in Bonesteel on Friday night. "There's no real issues as far as the gender."

The only time it becomes an issue?

They ask her to stay out of the locker room for a little bit at halftime," Beeman joked.

From day one of pre-season gatherings, Gale hasn't missed a practice or a video session with the Raiders and hasn't once mentioned the gender disparity, according to VanOsdel.

"It's a lot of fun, she fit in right away," he said. "It wasn't like we had to make any special accommodations. She doesn't want any different

Still, having a girl on a football team — regardless of class or level — is certainly unique. A brief look through other area football rosters did not show another instance of a female player.

When was the last time Beeman heard of a girl play-

Gale marks the fourth he's experienced, the coach said — the first while in high school, the second while coaching in Iowa, and the

third last year when Gayville-Volin played Marty Indian.

"But it's rare," Beeman

said with a smile.

No stranger to playing in

front of crowds, Gale was, however, greeted with a large audience for the Raiders' season opener at Corsica-Stickney on Aug. 29 in Stickney.

The atmosphere was a far cry from a club soccer game, she joked.

'To not disappoint them was a big thing for me," Gale

In a game Gayville-Volin would go on to win 31-8, Gale missed her first extra point attempt but later kicked one through the uprights to go 1-

Faith from her teammates is a big confidence-booster, she said.
"I think they all believe in

me enough, that even if I miss my first one (like she has the first two games), I know they'll still stick with me," Gale said.

Even if that means their touchdown drives aren't re-

warded with an extra point. "Hopefully they don't hold it against me at all," Gale

"We'll just score again and give you another chance,' VanOsdel added with a smile.

Having not one but two capable place-kickers (the other is junior Felix Lohmann, an exchange student) is understandably an adjustment for the Raiders

coaches, as well.
Put simply: Kicking isn't typically a staple of nine-man football.

'I don't doubt her, but I'm trying to convince myself we're good enough to make me feel comfortable," Beeman said, referring to Gayville-Volin sometimes going for a two-point conversion rather than an extra point try.

Schematically, it's easier to simply hand the ball off to a playmaker and let them sneak the ball in the end zone for two points, rather than the facets involved with an extra point or field goal from the snap, to the protection, to the hold, to the kick.

"If we get a good snap, a good hold and can protect, I'm confident that ball's going through the uprights with Bailey," Beeman said.

As for when — and from how far away — the Raiders would attempt a field goal in a close game, that remains to be seen.

"I'm not going to put that information out there what her range is," VanOsdel joked, "but we trust her."

Helping The Team

It's still early in the season, but the Raiders are feeling confident about 2014.

After Friday's road game at Burke-South Central, Gayville-Volin hosts Scotland and Avon in back-to-back weeks, before going to Viborg-Hurley and to Andes Central, then closing the regular season at home against Marty Indian.

"I don't want to get ahead of anyone, or myself, but yeah," VanOsdel said, when asked if he likes his team's chances. "I have strong expectations for this season, and I know everyone else does too.'

Gale included.

"It's fun to be apart of this, ringing that victory bell," she said. "Without playing and just watching, you get to see the boys do these things. But you never get the feeling of being a part of it.

"When they talk about the feeling of a Friday night game, they're not kidding."

Though she lives in Vermillion, Ğale said she and her teammates have been embraced by the Gayville and Volin communities.

'We're definitely a family, I would say," she said. "We have each other's back and can count on each other.

"Everybody comes out for things like this," she added. "They're a big part of the feeling of a Friday night football


VHS (5-1-2) started putting Garretson under duress seconds into the match and it paid off with a first minute goal by Maddie Regnerus.
