Teen Copes With Kidney Disease

CROFTON, Neb. -Mackenzie Foxhoven is a normal teenage girl. She likes to get to school early so she can talk to her friends during Encore time before classes start. She likes lunch, not so much for the food, but for the social interaction again with her friends. She likes volleyball after school because getting physical exercise is fun, too, and she's once again with her

But this last year has been anything else but normal for Mackenzie.

Last September she was diagnosed with a rare auto-immune disorder called pauci-immune glomerulonephritis, which is a very rare and aggressive disease affecting the kidneys

The Foxhoven family had just celebrated the first family wedding of their oldest daughter when Mackenzie came down with the flu. She just couldn't kick it and went to the Crofton Clinic where Jamie Miller, NP, tested her for mononucleosis, West Nile and Lyme disease. Finally, she was referred to a doctor in Yankton, who took one look at her kidney function results and sent her to Sanford Children's

Specialty Clinic in Sioux Falls. There Mackenzie met Dr. John Sanders, pediatric nephrology specialist, and his sidekick, "Nurse Libby." The family came home from the first Friday visit to the Sioux Falls clinic feeling relieved. Sanders first felt Mackenzie's test results were high because she had been drinking large amounts of Gatorade and eating lots of saltine crackers. After all, she thought she had

Upon returning home, the Foxhoven household received a phone call from the clinic. After reviewing the tests taken that day, Sanders decided they needed a closer look at Mackenzie's kidneys and set up a biopsy for Monday. It was a long weekend.

"We got the results before we came back home from the biopsy and I was relieved; at least we knew what it was even though I couldn't pronounce it," Mackenzie said.

Treatment was set up the same week and she received

an eight-hour infusion which would be the regime, once a month, for the next several months. It is a drug used for cancer and the staff at Sanford hoped it would slow down whatever was attacking her

"I always asked Mackenzie what she wanted to eat right after her infusion because a few hours later she would not have an appetite and that would last for a couple days, mom Nancy Foxhoven said. "And no matter what it was, I would go get it, rain, ice or whatever.'

The drug left a metallic taste in Mackenzie's mouth and for a day or two after each infusion, she would not feel well. It was just one of the unfortunate treatments she experienced in the last year. She also had a series of steroid treatments which made her hot and feeling like she exploded in size.

But that is all behind Mackenzie for now. She had the last infusion last month and the staff cautiously notes Mackenzie's disease is in remission for the time being and

remaining quiet. She will still take a maintenance drug and have a kidney panel drawn every month but she is relieved and very happy she has crossed a benchmark in treating her disease.

'Mackenzie has had a lot to think about in this past year," said dad Dale Foxhoven A lot more than other 14year-old girls and she is coming out on top.'

During the treatment process, the family learned other bits of information about the disorder. Doctors have learned it is a twopronged disease. One of the triggers comes from one of the parents because they are the carriers. The other trigger is not known or understood at this time. Something triggers the disease and research has not discovered what that is yet but they do know genetics is a factor. But there is no way to test for it now, either the parents or Mackenzie's siblings, until the disease pops

"Mackenzie's biopsy determined that at least a third of her kidney function had been

Nancy said. "And that cannot be reversed." Another concern the family and especially Mackenzie need to be aware of is the auto-immune aspect of the disease. She needs to respect how contracting simple illnesses like colds or the flu will be more serious for her to recover from.

Mackenzie will be celebrating her birthday soon and she would like to include the Sanford Clinic in her celebration. After talking to her mom, she noted there isn't much to do when waiting for doctor visits or treatments so she would like to collect items for children to play with or DVDs to

Some suggested items from the Sanford's Children's Hospital and the infusion center at the Sanford's Children's Clinic, which are preferred, include new card games, board games, arts and crafts, colors, books and new or used DVD's. New items are important because many of the children who go through the clinic have suppressed immune systems and don't need to contract germs from a used item.

These items will be given to Hospital and the infusion center at the Clinic when Mackenzie returns for a doctor checkup in October. Drop off points in Crofton would be the Crofton City Office, Farmers and Merchants State Bank of Crofton and the Sports Stop. Deadline for drop-off is Oct. 10. If there are any questions, they can call the Dale Foxhoven family.

The family would like to thank everyone for their thoughts, prayers and support during Mackenzie's treatment. One evening Mackenzie had so many visitors at the hospital that they had to wait downstairs and take turns coming up to her room.

"Mackenzie has been a trooper through this all. She has taken the challenge that God has given her and she is making the best of it. As parents, we couldn't be more proud of the way she has handled this," Nancy said. "Mackenzie is determined that even though this disease is going to be a part of her life ... it is not going to control her. She is going to fight to be...just

ensure that weapons don't fall into the wrong hands. "We have come a long way" in our ability to vet the moderate opposition, and the U.S. has learned a lot as it has funneled non-lethal aid to the rebels.

Dempsey said. House Republicans said they worried that Obama was responding tepidly to the current threat by terrorists who have overrun large sections of Iraq and Syria and beheaded two American journalists. "If it's important enough to fight, it's important enough to win,' said Rep. Jack Kingston, R-Ga.,

one of the first lawmakers to address the subject in several hours of scheduled debate. A vote was expected in the

House on Wednesday, and in the Senate within days. In the Senate, Republican leader Mitch McConnell announced he would support the measure and Democratic leader Harry Reid predicted bipartisan approval. The timetable was remarkably rapid by congressional standards, the result of a strong desire by lawmakers in both parties to adjourn quickly and return home to campaign for re-election. Only seven weeks before voters go to the polls, most Republicans had little stomach to oppose Obama on a matter of national security, particularly when polls suggest he has the support of

large segments of the public. As a result, the likelihood was that Congress would swing behind his request, and then return for a fuller debate of his war strategy in a postelection session of Congress.

"I think there's a lot more that we need to be doing, but there's no reason for us not to do what the president asked us to do," said Speaker John Boehner, the leader of House Republicans. Sen. Tim Kaine, D-Va., planned to introduce a one-year authorization for force against Islamic extremists that would limit the engagement of American ground troops, according to a draft obtained by The Associated Press. The Syria legislation also drew support from Levin, an influential voice among De mocrats on military matters.

He is retiring, but fellow Democrat Jeanne Shaheen of New Hampshire, who is in a difficult re-election race, said she intended to back Obama's request. Even so, she added it "would be a mistake" for Congress not to debate the issue in depth in the future.

Dempsey and Defense Secretary Chuck Hagel fielded questions as Obama met in the Oval Office with retired Marine Gen. John Allen, who is coordinating international efforts to combat the Islamic State militants

Later, White House press secretary Josh Earnest was asked about Dempsey's remark about ground troops. Obama "will not deploy ground troops in a combat role into Iraq or Syria," he said.
