Haggerty Relives Breakout Moment With Invite Win

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FREEMAN — The memories came flooding back for Ryan Haggerty as he came down the final straight-away.

He was right back to eleven

months ago.

Haggerty, a junior at Freeman Academy, surged late to win the individual title at Wednesday's Freeman Flyer cross country invitational at Valley View Golf Course — site of Haggerty's Region 3B crown last October.

'When I came around the (final) turn and looked up and saw the cart ahead of me, I had some good memories," he said

Haggerty finished in a time of 19:13, twenty seconds ahead of Centerville's Nick Wixon. Freeman Academy put five runners in the top 10 to take first place with eight points — 16 points ahead of McCrossan.

gerty feels confident. He broke onto the Class B scene a year ago by winning the region title and then finishing 11th at the state meet.

"That was definitely a break-out run for him," Freeman Academy head coach Suzanne Koerner said.

When he's not going on practice runs and competing in meets, Haggerty has found himself busy this fall also playing high school soccer for the Bobcats — now sanctioned.

There are weeks where Haggerty has four events (two soccer games and two cross country meets), but he says it helps him stay in shape.

Much like last year's region meet, Haggerty wasn't alone Wednesday.

Tennis: Gazelles Freshman Is 16-0 At Flight Five Singles

After a 21-11 record and a top-eight finish at flight six singles a year ago, Yankton's Anne Knoff went to work. A month into her freshman season, that work has showed.

Knoff takes a 16-0 record at flight five singles into today's (Thursday) girls' tennis dual at Vermillion.

'This is my second year, and one one has improved more in the last two years than her," Yankton tennis coach Matt Termansen said of Knoff. "It's a direct correlation to the work she's done in the off-season. No one has worked harder than her."

While Termansen had high expectations of Knoff, she has raised that bar, he noted.

"I knew she would be successful, but she has exceeded my expectations so

far." he said. Knoff spent much of her summer at

"She's a human backstop out there," Termansen said. "She almost never makes mistakes and she gets to every ball. She's won a lot of matches this year because her opponent gets frustrated.

Knoff also credits her mental ap-

proach. "I try to keep a positive mindset, that I can play with anybody," she said. "If I keep my head up and keep the ball in, I

Her success this season has Knoff as one of the favorites to win her flight in the Eastern South Dakota Conference.

"ESD, I'm hoping to place in singles, possibly first or second," she said. "I'm hoping to place top-five at state.

Termansen feels Knoff is capable of a top-five finish at state as well. She's beaten every top girl in the

state, other than O'Gorman and St. Thomas More," he said. Yankton's match with O'Gorman was called off due to the threat of poor weather. The Gazelles do not face St. Thomas More during the regular season. "She's never going to be one to make mistakes first, and she's never going to beat herself."

Yankton has four seniors on this year's squad, meaning that Knoff will be expected to be a team leader next year. But Termansen said that she's already leading by example.

"I have three seventh graders out here who see Anna and Mimi, see how much they've played, and are already talking about it for next summer," he said. "She's already being a leader. She's not a vocal leader, but she's leading by example."
