Huron Middle School Teacher Arrested

HURON (AP) — A seventh-grade teacher at Huron Middle School has been arrested on charges of disseminating harmful materials to a minor and marijuana possession, law enforce-

ment officials said Thursday.
Thomas Wendelgass, 30, was arrested Thursday afternoon on charges stemming from alleged inappropriate conversations between the teacher and a person under the age of 18, according to the South Dakota Attorney General's Office. Both charges are Class One misdemeanors.

Sara Rabern, a spokeswoman with the Attorney General's office, said she couldn't elaborate on the details of the case because there may be additional charges.

Huron Schools Superintendent Terry Nebelsick said the alleged incidents didn't take place on school grounds and the marijuana was not found at school. He also said the allega-

tions don't involve a current student or other staff members. Nebelsick said Wendelgass has been suspended while the case is pending and is not to have contact with district stu-

Wendelgass is starting his second year as a geography teacher at Huron Middle School, but Nebelsick said he's known him all his life. Nebelsick said he was the Huron High School principal when Wendelgass graduated from there in

"Obviously I have great faith in every one of our 300-some staff members so I'm heartbroken when something like this comes up in any organization and most particularly in one I've been a part of for 21 years," he said.

It was unclear Thursday afternoon whether Wendelgass has legal representation.

Jackson County Sued Over Indian Voting

RAPID CITY (AP) — A group representing four members of the Oglala Sioux Tribe has filed a federal lawsuit against Jackson County, claiming it doesn't given equal voting access to Native American voters.

Part of the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation is located in the county. Lawyers' Committee for Civil Rights Under Law filed the complaint Thursday in Rapid City.

It says Jackson County has refused to open a satellite office in Wanblee, so people who live on the reservation have to drive farther to the county seat of Kadoka to register to vote and cast ballots early.

The state's attorney could not be reached. The county auditor said she hadn't seen the complaint.

Winning Powerball Sold In 2 S.D. Cities

ABERDEEN (AP) — A Powerball ticket sold in Aberdeen is worth \$10,000 in the Wednesday drawing, and a ticket sold in Rapid City is worth \$20,000.

South Dakota lottery officials say both tickets matched four of five white ball numbers and the Powerball to win the game's \$10,000 third prize. The odds are 1 in about 650,000. The Rapid City winner purchased an option for \$1 that doubled that prize.

The winners have about six months to claim the money. The jackpot sits at \$196 million for the next drawing, on Saturday.

Prison Inmate Charged With Killing Cellmate

SIOUX FALLS - A South Dakota inmate serving a 75-year sentence on rape and sexual contact charges involving children was indicted Thursday on allegations that he killed his cellmate at the tate Penitentiary in Sioux Falls.

The grand jury's indictment charges Douglas Ipsen, 28, with alternate counts of first-degree murder, second-degree murder and first-degree manslaughter for the death of convicted killer Kent Davidson. Ipsen could be convicted on one of those three charges

The 37-year-old Davidson, whose body was found in his cell, died from strangulation and asphyxia, according to his death certificate. He was hurt late on Sept. 7 and died early on Sept. 8. Authorities said a bedsheet was used in the

Attorney General Marty Jackley would not discuss details of the investigation including motive. It's unclear whether Ipsen has an attor-

Ipsen is serving 60 years for first-degree rape of a child and an additional 15 years for sexual contact with a child under the age of 16, both out of Butte County. He arrived at the penitentiary on September 2010.

The South Dakota Department of Corrections had deemed Ipsen a "low moderate" risk, while Davidson was assessed as a "moderate'



Since the killing, Ipsen is being housed in a single-cell at a disciplinary unit of the penitentiary's Jameson Annex, Corrections Department spokeswoman Mandy Nielsen said.

Davidson pleaded guilty to first-degree murder in April in the 2013 shooting death of his girlfriend Crystal Schulz. Her body was found in a shed at her

mother's rural Chamberlain residence, and Davidson was arrested hours later after a standoff with police.

Schulz and Davidson were engaged, but court documents show that Schulz was ending the relationship.

Davidson's mother, Pamela Davidson, told The Associated Press on Monday that she's now lost both of her children. Her younger son, Travis, was killed in a car crash six years ago

The woman, who lives in Jamestown, North Dakota, said she hadn't spoken to her son, Kent, in about three years and said the hardest part is she wasn't able to say goodbye. His body was cremated in Sioux Falls before it was sent to North Dakota.

In addition to murder charges, Davidson also was serving a five-year sentence for forgery out of Tripp County and a five-year sentence for second-degree escape out of Minnehaha County.

Huether Finds Lessons In N.D. Oil Boomtown

SIOUX FALLS (AP) -North Dakota's bustling oil patch has opportunities and lessons for the Sioux Falls area, the mayor of South Dakota's largest city said.

Mike Huether traveled to the oil patch hub of Williston this week along with city Planning Director Mike Cooper to get a firsthand look at the boomtown. Williston's population has doubled since 2010, to an estimated 30,000 people, and the city's physical size has tripled through annexa-

The use of local sales tax revenue to fund costs in Williston and surrounding Williams County associated with the rapid growth could be a lesson for Sioux Falls and surrounding Minnehaha County, according to Huether. South Dakota currently has no provision for counties to levy sales

The mayor also said that more South Dakota companies can capitalize on the North Dakota boom by expanding there.

State Board Increases Wharf Mine's Bonds

PIERRE — Wharf Resources will need to post more financial assurance against possible damage to water and land in the Black Hills to continue mining gold

The South Dakota Board of Minerals and Environment increased two of Wharf's bonds Thursday.

The cyanide spill bond is going up \$17,100 to a new total of \$597,800. The additional amount reflects inflation based on the construction-cost index.

The reclamation bond is climbing \$1,393,000 to reflect 62 additional acres that have been disturbed by the mining operations at Terry Peak. The new reclamation total is \$35,786,000.

The post-closure bond of \$30.8 million wasn't changed. Staff for the state Department of Environment and

Natural Resources calculated the amounts.

Wharf is the only largescale gold mining operation that remains in the Black Hills. The Canada-based company has irrevocable letters of credit for the bonds on file with the New York branch of Scotiabank.

"The difficult part is, the logistics are all going to change on this," he said. "When you do start finding a place where you can place a tower, it's not going to be as simple as it was. You're going to have these put in strategic locations, meaning that the other eight sites, when we do put up (the first) two, will most likely have to be changed to logistically cover as much area as we want to cover out there."

Commissioner Allen Sinclair suggested going back to the siren companies themselves to seek advice for how to proceed in the future.

"I think you need to get a hold of the folks that install these sirens and see what they suggest," Sinclair said. "They put up sirens in all the United States — these are big companies we're talking about. I would hope they would have some ideas about design. And maybe we need to take them back out there and look at the locations again and see if they can be adjusted enough to deal with visibility issues.

Jensen said now the commission will seek to hold meetings for public input on how to move forward with the siren project over the winter and he hopes to pick up the issue again in the spring. In other business, the com-
