LINCOLN, Neb. — The Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) and Federal Transit Administration (FTÁ) require each state highway agency to develop a Statewide Transportation Improvement Program (STIP). The STIP must list all highway and transit projects that will be using federal funds, as well as all regionally significant transportation projects using non-federal funding sources. It covers a period of four years and in Nebraska is updated every year on Oct. 1.

Periodically, the Nebraska Department of Roads (NDOR) must amend the STIP for reasons such as; to add or remove projects, to make adjustments to funding sources or estimates or to update a project's scope of work.

Federal law requires that all citizens

transportation planning process be given reasonable opportunity to comment on the proposed STIP and on any proposed amendments to an approved STIP. NDOR uses statewide news releases and an automated email subscription management system called GovDelivery to inform the public and advise them of the means and time period to comment on STIP's and any amendments. All comments will be addressed and those responses reported to the FHWA and FTA.

The revision, referred to as Revision 7, is available for public comment on the NDOR website www.transportation.nebraska.gov/STIP/index-publiccomment.html through 5 p.m. CDT Aug.

The FHWA and the FTA will not approve the revision until the public

comment period has ended and comments have been evaluated and incorporated in the revision as appropriate.

Copies of the Public Involvement Plan for the Nebraska Department of Roads' STIP are available from each of the eight district offices. (See the attached map of the district offices and contact information.) A copy of the proposed STIP Public Involvement Plan may be obtained upon request to the Communication Office, 1500 Highway 2, P.O. Box 94759, Lincoln, NE 68509-4759, or by calling (402) 479-4512 or by e-mail at maryjo.oie@nebraska.gov.

Under federal legislation, the Nebraska Department of Roads is required to have a public involvement plan for the STIP in place. This plan can be viewed at www.transportation.nebraska.gov/STIP/.

Dakota Territorial Museum Gets Grant

The Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) has awarded \$112,505 to the Yankton County Historical Society for the Dakota Territorial Museum.

The museum will use the grant funds to gain intellectual and physical control of the collections by:

• completing an inventory of the entire collection;

• upgrading the storage environment by monitoring the temperature and humidity and use archival containers and

• increase resources to document condition, re-house, pack in labeled boxes and enter locations in PastPerfect Museum Management Database;

• and create a Move Plan and prepare staff/volunteers for transfer of the newly inventoried, re-housed, labeled/packed collections to a new Mead facility in 2018.

"Our grants are highly competitive. The Institute of Museum and Library Services enlists hundreds of library and museum professionals throughout the United States to review grant applications and make recommendations on projects most worthy of funding," said IMLS Director Susan H. Hildreth. "Receiving a grant from IMLS is significant achievement, and we congratulate the Yankton County Historical Society for being among the 2014 IMLS museum grantees.

Deadwood Fund Grant Apps. Due Oct. 1

PIERRE — The South Dakota State Historical Society has announced that applications for the next round of the Deadwood Fund grant program are due on Oct. 1, for work beginning Jan. 1, 2015.

The program is designed to encourage large-scale restoration or rehabilitation of historic properties by individuals, organizations or public agencies, according to Jay D. Vogt. director of the State Historical Society at the Cultural Heritage Center in Pierre, whose historic preservation office adminis-

Grants will be awarded in amounts ranging from \$1,000 to \$25,000. The grant amount must be matched on a dollar-fordollar basis from nonfederal and nonstate sources. Nonprofit organizations will be allowed to use in-kind services for onehalf of their match.

In 2013, more than \$126,700 was distributed among 11 projects, which resulted in a total public-private investment of more than \$473,300.

Funding for the program is from Deadwood gaming revenue earmarked by state law for historic preservation projects throughout the state and distributed by the State Historical


