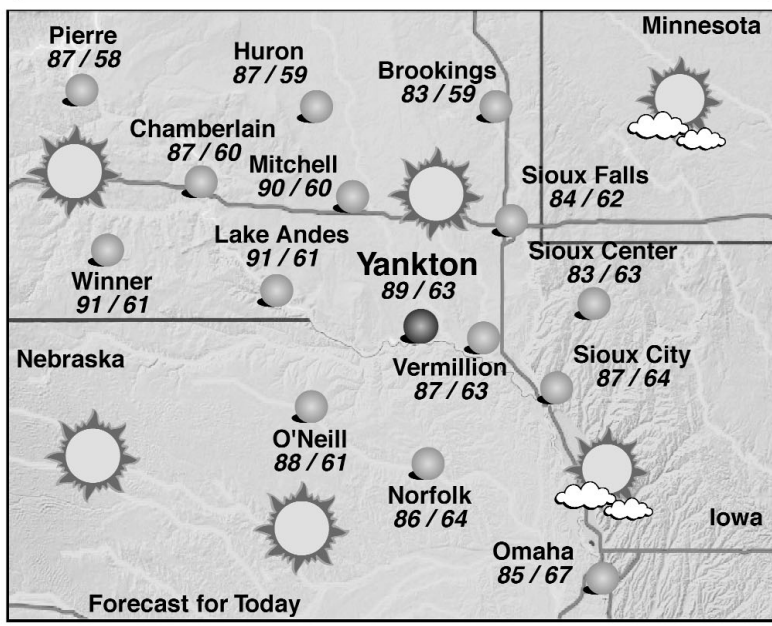

State Transportation Improvement Plan Revision Announced

LINCOLN, Neb. — The Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) and Federal Transit Administration (FTA) require each state highway agency to develop a Statewide Transportation Improvement Program (STIP). The STIP must list all highway and transit projects that will be using federal funds, as well as all regionally significant transportation projects using non-federal funding sources. It covers a period of four years and in Nebraska is updated every year on Oct. 1.

Periodically, the Nebraska Department of Roads (NDOR) must amend the STIP for reasons such as; to add or remove projects, to make adjustments to funding sources or estimates or to update a project's scope of work.

Federal law requires that all citizens and other interested parties in the State's

transportation planning process be given reasonable opportunity to comment on the proposed STIP and on any proposed amendments to an approved STIP. NDOR uses statewide news releases and an automated email subscription management system called GovDelivery to inform the public and advise them of the means and time period to comment on STIP's and any amendments. All comments will be addressed and those responses reported to the FHWA and FTA.

The revision, referred to as Revision 7, is available for public comment on the NDOR website www.transportation.nebraska.gov/STIP/index-public-comment.html through 5 p.m. CDT Aug. 19.

The FHWA and the FTA will not approve the revision until the public

comment period has ended and comments have been evaluated and incorporated in the revision as appropriate.

Copies of the Public Involvement Plan for the Nebraska Department of Roads' STIP are available from each of the eight district offices. (See the attached map of the district offices and contact information.) A copy of the proposed STIP Public Involvement Plan may be obtained upon request to the Communication Office, 1500 Highway 2, P.O. Under federal legislation, the Nebraska Department of Roads is required to have a public involvement plan for the STIP in place. This plan can be viewed at www.transportation.nebraska.gov/STIP/.

Dakota Territorial Museum Gets Grant

The Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) has awarded \$112,505 to the Yankton County Historical Society for the Dakota Territorial Museum.

The museum will use the grant funds to gain intellectual and physical control of the collections by:

- completing an inventory of the entire collection;
- upgrading the storage environment by monitoring the temperature and humidity and use archival containers and supplies;
- increase resources to document condition, re-house, pack in labeled boxes and enter locations in PastPerfect Museum Management Database;
- and create a Move Plan and prepare staff/volunteers for transfer of the newly inventoried, re-housed, labeled/packed collections to a new Mead facility in 2018.

"Our grants are highly competitive. The Institute of Museum and Library Services enlists hundreds of library and museum professionals throughout the United States to review grant applications and make recommendations on projects most worthy of funding," said IMLS Director Susan H. Hildreth. "Receiving a grant from IMLS is significant achievement, and we congratulate the Yankton County Historical Society for being among the 2014 IMLS museum grantees."

IMLS museum grants support a wide variety of projects that create learning experiences, strengthen community communities, care for collections and provide broad public access.

"When word arrived that we had finally, after a number of attempts, received this grant, our staff was very excited not just for the award itself but the opportunity it brings with it for the museum and the Mead Building Project," said Museum Director, Crystal Nelson. "This grant is just a stepping stone for many other federal grants that will allow the Dakota Territorial Museum collection be ready for a move to the Mead Building."

Hay Removal From State Highway Right Of Way Deadline Set

PIERRE — The South Dakota Department of Transportation requests the cooperation of all farmers and ranchers in removing processed hay from the highway right of way.

State regulations require that hay be removed from the

right of way within 30 days of being processed, but no later than Oct. 1.

Removing hay bales from the highway right of way is an important safety consideration for motorists. The bales or stacks can be a safety hazard for vehicles forced to

leave the road and, in some cases, can restrict a driver's sight distance. Hay left in the road ditches late in the year can also cause snowdrifts across the highway.

WALL ST. RECAP

NEW YORK (AP) — The U.S. stock market closed at record highs on Thursday following another piece of good news on the economy. Fewer Americans filed first-time claims for unemployment benefits last week, according to the Labor Department. That came a day after the Federal Reserve on Wednesday made clear it would keep interest rates near zero for a while.

The Dow Jones industrial average climbed 109.14 points, or 0.6 percent, to 17,265.99.

The Standard & Poor's 500 index rose 9.79 points, or 0.5 percent, to 2,011.36.

The Nasdaq composite rose 31.24 points, or 0.7 percent, to 4,593.43.
