US Chief Justice Worried About Partisanship

LINCOLN, Neb. — U.S. Supreme Court Chief Justice John Roberts expressed concern Friday about growing partisanship in the judicial confirmation process and a public perception that politics factor into the court's rulings.

Roberts told an audience at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln College of Law that the partisan atmosphere in Washington would make it unlikely for justices such as Antonin Scalia, widely viewed as a conservative, or Ruth Bader Ginsburg, who is seen as liberal, to win confirmation today.

He pointed to the most recent U.S. Senate confirmation of Justice Elena Kagan in 2010, which fell largely on party lines. Roberts said the politics displayed through the process feeds the public's belief that the court is a political body akin to Congress and the White House. His remarks came during a public question-and-answer session sponsored by the university's Roman L. Hruska Institute for the Administration of Justice.

"I'm worried about people having that perception, because it's not an accurate one," Roberts told an audience estimated at 500. "It's not how we do our work, and it's important that we make that as clear as we can to the public."

Roberts was appointed by President George W. Bush in 2005, in an era when the court is increasingly viewed as political and has broken in many rulings along liberal and conservative lines. But

he said the nation's founding fathers "knew what they were doing" when they provided lifetime tenure for justices, without elections or partisanship.

"I don't want it to spill over and affect us," he said. "That's not the way we do business. We're not Republicans or Democrats."

Roberts, who rarely speaks in public, offered a glimpse of the court's inner workings and gave advice to lawyers who argue before the court. He said assigning cases is the best part of his job, and he tries to give each justice a mix of important cases and those he deemed "dogs."

He urged attorneys to keep their legal briefs short, noting that most are close to the 50-page average limit. Because of the length of each brief and the number the court receives, he said, a 35-page brief stands out.

"The first thing you do is look at the cover — because you like that lawyer," Roberts said, drawing laughter from the crowd. "The second thing you do is think, 'Well, he may have a good case, if it only takes him 35 pages to lay out his case. You're going to read that brief a lot more carefully.'"

Roberts acknowledged that the justices sometimes ask too many questions, to the point that he has to referee them.

Roberts was asked questions by the chief judge of the U.S. Eighth Circuit Court of Appeals, William Jay Riley, who graduated from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln College of Law.

Neb. State Board Adds Gender Identity To Proposed Rules

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) — A Nebraska licensing board has proposed adding language to its rules to prevent mental health professionals from discriminating against clients based on gender identity.

The Mental Health Practice Board added language to its proposed ethics code Thursday that would prevent discrimination against people who identify with a different gender than the one they were born with.

But attorneys for the state Department of Health and Human Services have told the board the proposed rules won't move forward if gender identity is part of the anti-discrimination list. They said it's because that language is not found in state statute.

The *Lincoln Journal Star* reports the board's approval of the language likely guarantees the proposed ethics code won't be approved.

\$117 Million Events Center Opening Its Doors In SF

SIoux FALLS (AP) — Doors were scheduled to open Friday for a \$117 million events center in Sioux Falls that will feature events such as hockey, arena football, basketball, rodeos and concerts.

The 12,000-seat Denny Sanford Premier Center took two years to build. The city borrowed \$115 million to build the facility and Sanford Health contributed \$2 million for an electronic scoreboard.

The building will be the home to two Sioux Falls sports franchises — the United States Hockey League team the Stampede and the Indoor Football League team the Storm. It will also be the site for the Summit League basketball tournament. Stampede spokesman Jim

Olander said the arena is comparable to a National Hockey League facility.

"We're really excited," he said. "It's an amazing building."

Wes Hall, the Sioux Falls Sports Authority executive director, said the center will be ideal for Summit League players and fans.

"They'll be more comfortable in this building," he said. "You look back at the old arena, we had some makeshift locker rooms that we had to build just for the Summit League, and now we actually have permanent locker rooms in this building."

The facility also is attracting entertainers. Rocker Joan Jett is scheduled to play on Wednesday. The facility's grand opening is Oct. 3, with

country superstars Jason Aldean and Florida Georgia Line headlining. Other musical acts scheduled before the end of the year are Demi Lovato, Cher, Slipknot and Eric Church.

Arena officials say more than half of the tickets sold for the first few concerts at the venue have been bought by out-of-towners. About one-fifth have gone to people in eight other states, including Minnesota and North Dakota.

Keith Thompson, senior project manager with Koch Hazard Architects, said the design included 1,000 sheets of architectural drawings. The arena is "second to none," he said.

Friday's schedule included a ribbon-cutting ceremony and open house.

Pine Ridge Breaks Ground On \$9 Million Housing Project

PINE RIDGE (AP) — Members of the Oglala Sioux Tribe say a \$9 million project for new homes is an important step in solving a housing crisis on the Pine Ridge Reservation.

Tribal leaders and others involved in the project broke ceremonial ground Thursday on the plan to add 63 three-bedroom homes, the *Rapid City Journal* reported.

"Today is a big day for us," said Paul Iron Cloud, the chief executive officer of Oglala Sioux Lakota Housing. "Building homes is a big issue on Pine Ridge. It's a lot of work, and if we work together, we can get it done."

The project includes two

pieces. A 45-home development will be built through a \$6 million federal Housing and Urban Development loan. An 18-home project is funded through a combination of a \$2 million HUD grant and \$1 million from Oglala Sioux Lakota Housing.

Members of the housing authority say it's typical for two dozen family members to live in one small residence.

"This is everywhere," Oglala Sioux President Bryan Brewer said, referring to the cramped conditions.

Iron Cloud said the groundbreaking was the culmination of nearly two years of behind-the-scenes work.

He said the authority also is applying for an additional HUD grant that could deliver \$1.4 million for nine more homes.

Brewer said work is also underway to acquire land and build more housing developments or apartments; 220,000 acres already have been secured through the tribe's land buy-back program.

"I testified when I first got into office in Washington (D.C.) that we needed 4,000 homes," Brewer said. "When I got back, we got the accurate data. We need 12,000 homes. That's what we need to meet the needs of the people."

Older Workers Week Starts Sept. 21

PIERRE — Gov. Dennis Daugaard has issued a proclamation to celebrate National Employ Older Workers Week on Sept. 21-27. This week is designed to support workers past the traditional retirement age who have remained in the workforce or re-entered it.

"Older workers play an important role in growing our workforce," said Gov. Daugaard. "This is one population group employers should consider when filling job openings."

The Senior Community Service Employment Program (SCSEP), funded by a grant from the U.S. Department of Labor, brings employment and training opportunities to older Americans across the nation.

The program currently serves about 100,000 seniors each year nationally. It has helped millions of Americans find jobs in community service and the private sector.

"The Department of Labor and Regulation helps older workers with their training and employment needs," said state Labor and Regulation Secretary Marcia Hultman. "We work hard to educate employers about the characteristics older workers have to offer, such as judgment, punctuality and commitment to quality."

The state Department of Labor and Regulation receives the SCSEP grant and administers it through a sub-grantee program called Experience Works. Participants are offered training opportunities in various fields while they prepare to transition into full- or part-time employment in the public and private sectors.

SD Leads Nation In Flu Vaccinations Rate

PIERRE (AP) — The state Health Department says South Dakota had the nation's highest percentage for influenza vaccinations last season.

Figures released by the Center for Disease Control and Prevention show that nearly 60 percent of South Dakotas received flu shots. The state ranked among the top 10 for every age group but one.

State epidemiologist Dr. Lon Kightlinger says the numbers are encouraging, but those who are not getting vaccinated include young children who are at high risk for complications.

The state offers free flu vaccine for people between the ages of six months and 18 years.

SD Police Chase Ends With Crash

RAPID CITY (AP) — Three teenagers have been arrested in Rapid City after leading police on a brief chase that ended with their car in flames.

The Rapid City Journal reports a Rapid City police officer tried to pull over 18-year-old Robert Young Dog Jr. around 2 a.m. Friday. Police say he was driving erratically.

The officer estimates Young Dog was driving 50 mph before his car went airborne and crashed into a tree. Police say the car then caught fire.

The newspaper says Young Dog is in serious condition. It's unclear the condition of the other two passengers.

Police have charged Young Dog with four crimes, including DUI and aggravated eluding. Officers also cited 18-year-old Laycie Williams for underage consumption and the 17-year-old passenger for underage drinking and marijuana possession.

Prosecution Rests In Trial Of SD Teen

WINNER (AP) — Prosecutors have finished presenting evidence in the Winner trial of a Pierre teenager accused of killing a classmate.

KCCR-AM reports the prosecution rested late Friday morning. The defense will start its case Monday morning and should be done Tuesday, so closing arguments are set for Wednesday.

Eighteen-year-old Braiden McCahren pleaded not guilty to first-degree murder in the December 2012 shooting death of 16-year-old Dalton Williams. McCahren was 16 at the time of the shooting at his home but he's being tried as an adult.

High Court: New Trial For Neb. Man

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — The Nebraska Supreme Court has ordered a new trial for a Lincoln man convicted of attempted sexual assault, saying the trial judge wrongly applied Nebraska's rape shield law when he refused to allow the alleged victim to be questioned about her relationship with another woman.

The decision Friday came in the case of Curtis Lavalleur, who appealed his 2013 conviction.

Lavalleur's attorney sought to cross-examine the woman Lavalleur was accused of assaulting about her relationship, saying he wanted to establish a motive for her to falsely report that she had not consented to sexual activities with Lavalleur.

On appeal, Lavalleur argued that evidence of an intimate relationship, by itself, is not within the scope of Nebraska's rape shield law.

The high court agreed and ordered a new trial.

Contractor To Face Lawsuit Over Death

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) — The Nebraska Supreme Court has revived a lawsuit against a general contractor over the 2008 death of a worker.

Jose Sanchez Dominguez was attaching roof panels to a Wal-Mart under construction in Omaha when one gave way. He was not wearing a required safety harness and fell 40 feet. Dominguez died at a hospital.

Dominguez's estate sued. A Douglas County District Court judge later dismissed Wal-Mart Stores Inc. and Graham Construction Inc. from the lawsuit, saying neither retained control over the work Dominguez performed for a subcontractor.

On Friday, the state's high court agreed that Wal-Mart could not be held liable, but said a jury should decide whether Graham Construction had knowledge that Dominguez was not using his safety harness, and could therefore be found liable for his death.

Man Guilty Of Helping Mom In Stabbing

HASTINGS, Neb. (AP) — Jurors found a 24-year-old Guide Rock man guilty of helping his mother stab her boyfriend's 68-year-old mother.

Andrew J. Casterline was convicted Thursday of first-degree murder, use of a deadly weapon to commit a felony and burglary in the October 2013 death of Virginia Barone, the *Hastings Tribune* reported.

Barone's body was found partially covered by boards in her Guide Rock home last fall. Prosecutors argued Casterline helped his mother attack Barone, who was stabbed twice in the back and 20 times in the chest and torso.

Sentencing is scheduled for Dec. 15 in Red Cloud.

His mother, Shelley Casterline, 41, pleaded guilty in March to second-degree murder. She faces 20 years to life in prison and will be sentenced later this month. They are both being held without bond.

Shelley Casterline said she had a bad relationship with Barone and that she had gone to Barone's house to retrieve her cellphone and some clothes. She said they got into an argument before Barone hit her, making her angry. She said she grabbed a knife, stabbed Barone in the back and later tossed the weapon into a cornfield.

Casterline said her son did not help her fatally stab Barone but only helped her move the body.

Prosecutors said Casterline's statements did not match what she told investigators and that she was lying to protect her son.
