said rocked the Anderson family.

“The doctor came back in the room, looked at Brendan and said ‘Brendan, you are a very sick boy,’” Marc said. “She said his blood work showed that his platelets were extremely low—so low, that they wouldn’t let me drive him to the hospital in Sioux Falls — they wanted to fly him there by helicopter.” Marc said if Brendan were to get a nose bleed while driving to Sioux Falls, he would have bled out.

“She told me she thought it might be leukemia, but that they needed to do the tests in Sioux Falls,” he said. “I had to go home, explain to my wife what was going on. We had to race to Sioux Falls, and all the time I was thinking, ‘This can’t be real.’ He noted that he and his wife, Rebecca, were in shock, but didn’t want to scare Brendan.

“We got to Sioux Falls Sanford Children’s Castle of Care Hospital in Sioux Falls where the doctors did more blood work and came back with the diagnosis of AML,” Marc said. AML is acute myeloid leukemia. According to the American Cancer Society, acute leukemia usually develops quickly. The number of leukemia cells increases rapidly, and these abnormal cells don’t do the work of normal white blood cells. A bone marrow test may show a high level of leukemia cells

midst of. He has been employed since mid-August when the teachers began for this school year. Today is his last official day.”

Kindle said parents in the district should understand that the district makes decisions based on what is best for the students, and in this case, that was to accept the resignation.

“We are going to move forward with a new teacher

and low levels of normal blood cells. People with acute leukemia may feel very tired, bruise easily and get infections frequently. AML affects myeloid cells and grows quickly. Leukemic blast cells collect in the bone marrow and blood.

About 15,000 Americans were diagnosed with AML in 2013. About 8,000 were 65 or older, and about 870 children and teens were diagnosed with the disease.

“We were told we needed to start treatment right away,” Marc said. “He went to the clinic on Saturday, and on Tuesday he started his first round of chemotherapy. They told us his bone marrow was 60 percent full of cancer cells and that it was in his spinal fluid.”

Marc said the doctors described the chemotherapy they were going to use as a very aggressive—“like shooting a bazooka at it.”

The first round of chemotherapy would be every 12 hours for 10 days, at which point they would then again look at his counts.

“His numbers started coming back slowly,” he said. “We actually got to take him home in mid-August. School had already started.”

The family had two weeks of waiting to see where Brendan’s numbers would be. It turned out a second round of chemotherapy was needed. It would be two times a day for eight days.

“We completed the second round about three weeks ago,” Marc said. “His counts had come up enough that he was able to come

and get that going as soon as possible,” he said. “Again, the resignation was accepted today and we will get someone in there as soon as we can.”

For the short term, Kindle said high school principal Dr. Jennifer Johnke and he would be utilizing substitute teachers and rearranging other staff to cover the classes taught by Erickson.

“We have had some subs there working and helping us out,” Kindle said. “Subs in this district are great, and not easy to find. But we have some very good ones and are very appreciative of that.

We have also had other staff members step up and help out. That is what you do when you need to, and we are very appreciative of that.

“We are still going to need somebody to cover some other teaching responsibilities. We have a bit of work to do, but we are going to get right on that and get a new hire here as soon as possible.”

AML is a non-hereditary cancer. At this point, doctors don’t know what causes it. However, Marc said that it is a very curable, treatable form of cancer.

He also noted that he has learned a lot about the person he wants to be because of the battle Brendan is fighting.

“I am so aware of what I am going to be doing for other people,” he said. “Avon has to be the best community in the whole world. The overwhelming support and care has been so humbling.

When asked what can be done to help the family, Marc said to donate blood.

“I used to give blood all the time, and when we moved to Avon, I kind of quit,” he said. “With everything that has gone on with Brendan, you realize how important it is.”

He laid out the potential of taking advantage of a grant from the governor’s office.

“This isn’t the main reason for being here today: to put together a grant,” Henderson said. “But it can act as an incentive for you to pull this topic together as a community and move forward. The program is the Community Incentives Matching Program — a product of the Governor’s Workforce Initiative meetings that were held earlier this year. ... It’s a \$1 million fund coming out of the Future’s Fund, so it’s some discretionary money that the governor has access to.”

The grant applications are due Nov. 21; it is only a one-time deal and requires a

1:1 cash match. Henderson said the application will require cooperation.

“The state is really looking for what they call a multi-sector approach,” he said. They want education, government and business at a minimum to be working together on this. It doesn’t mean that everybody needs to ante up, but it means everybody has to be in the game.”

Also discussed was how the nine-county area around Yankton has been losing people at a rate of around 900 per year.

Kramer said this loss of young people is unacceptable.

“I’ve been going to these rural communities and sitting in their local cafes and asking these 18-to-30-year-olds, ‘What are you going to do after you graduate from high school (or are already in the workforce)?’” Kramer

said. “You’d be surprised. They’re looking for careers and they’re thinking Omaha, Sioux Falls, the Twin Cities and they don’t know anything about the opportunities in this region, including Yankton,” he said. “We’re losing 900 people in this nine-county area between the ages of 18 and 30 and we can’t afford that anymore.”

He added the city needs to be better at marketing itself.

“(Young people) communicate differently,” he said. “How do you get in front of them? I don’t know, but we better figure that out. YAPG is already funding close to \$100,000 working with RTEC (Regional Technical Education Center) and (the Yankton School District) setting up websites and additional resources. But we need our companies to come to the table if we’re able to find solutions. They’re spending a great deal of money trying to

recruit these people, and whatever they’re doing isn’t working. We’re just asking them to use some of those resources to develop a program that will work.”

Kramer said the addition of a two-year technical education program is needed.

“We’re at a significant disadvantage not having one,” he said. “Having a two-year institution that’s focused to the jobs we’re generating — and pre-training those welders and machinists here with the same support a Mitchell company would get — is what we should be doing.”
