

Organizations Team Up To Provide Family Caregiver Training

As Americans continue to live longer and in greater numbers, there are more and more people filling the role of caregiver for others in the home.

Recognizing this growing need and the important role family caregivers play, Avera Education & Staffing Solutions, Yankton Rural Area Health Education Center (AHEC) and Southeast Job Link have joined together in offering a community education program designed to assist family caregivers in properly caring for adult family members.

"Know that as a caregiver you are not alone. Each caregiver situation is unique, yet all share universal experiences that encompass physical, emotional and spiritual — as well as economic and legal — concerns," said Gwen Maag, Education Manager for Avera Education & Staffing Solutions.

The Family Caregiver Training offers five clinical sessions and a series of informational sessions beginning in September and running through November. The clinical sessions delivered by a trained medical professional are open to 12 participants. Those satisfactorily completing the clinical portion will receive a certificate. Any individual may sign up for one, some or all of the informational sessions. There is a fee for each session.

Registration is necessary to secure your place in each session. All sessions will be held at Southeast JobLink, 1200 West 21st Street, in Yankton.

Topics covered during the Family Caregiver Training include: The Basics of Family Caregiving, Caregiving Tips, Caring for the Caregiver, and legal and financial issues to consider and where to turn for help. Clinical sessions are on Saturday mornings beginning Sept. 12 and continuing on Sept. 26, Oct. 10, Oct. 24 and Nov. 14. The Saturday morning sessions will run 9 a.m. until noon. Informational sessions are scheduled for alternating Tuesday and Thursday evenings on Sept. 17, Sept. 29, Oct. 8, Oct. 20, and Nov. 5. The informational sessions run 7 p.m. until 8:30 p.m.

Health conditions that commonly lead to the need for a caregiver in the home include: chronic brain disorders, such as dementia, Alzheimer's disease, Parkinson's disease and traumatic brain or spinal cord injury. Other conditions include: multiple sclerosis, HIV/AIDS, cancer, cardiovascular diseases such as stroke or heart attack, chronic diseases associated with ongoing disability, mental health and psychiatric disorders and developmental disability.

"The process of educating and preparing the caregiver may help them to reduce stress and better cope with the many challenges of caregiving. It is a myth that most of our nation's elderly are cared for in nursing homes or health care institutions," Maag said adding that family members and friends primarily provide 80 percent of the long-term care at home in the U.S.

Nearly 30 percent of the U.S. adult population is providing care to someone who is ill, disabled or aged, according to the National Alliance for Caregiving & Family Caregiver Alliance. Approximately 52 million caregivers provide care to adults, 18 years and older with a disability or illness.

The number of people aged 65 and older will grow by nearly 30 million between 2012 and 2030, reaching an estimated 72 million people by US Census Bureau projections. People are not only living longer today than in the past but with multiple, chronic health conditions. Expect to see more adult children in their 60s or 70s with chronic conditions of their own, caring for a parent age 90 years and older, according to the AARP.

The caregiving journey may be rewarding and difficult. Remember, as a caregiver you are not alone and help is available. "The quiz bowl is a fun way for high school students to learn about safety on the farm or ranch," says Hofhenke, of the

competition that asks FFA members questions on farm and ranch safety.

Teams qualified for the championship during the S.D. State FFA Convention held this April. The teams include members from the following chapters: Viborg/Hurley FFA Chapter; Parker FFA Chapter; Deuel FFA Chapter; and Howard FFA Chapter. The Wolsey/Wessington FFA Chapter ranked fifth in points and will be the alternate team for the final round.

"We hope the information they learn during the quiz bowl will prepare them if they are ever faced with an emergency situation or if they're working with livestock or doing any other potentially dangerous job on the farm," Hofhenke said.

Farmers Union Celebrates Another Successful Camp

HURON — More than 1,729 rural youth, ages 6 to 18, learned about cooperatives, developed leadership skills and celebrated South Dakota's agriculture industry together by attending a Farmers Union County, District or State camp this summer.

"Camps are a wonderful way for S.D. Farmers Union to fulfill our commitment to providing rural youth with leadership education, as well as exposure to farm safety information and a clear understanding of the role cooperatives play in South Dakota's rural communities," says Bonnie Geyer, S.D. Farmers Union Education Director.

Each year, Geyer, along with a team made up of interns and members of the Junior and Senior Advisory Council, develop camp programming which achieves the aforementioned goals through fun, age-appropriate activities. They then work with district and county education directors who volunteer their time to organize the 51 county camps (with 59 counties participating), three district camps (seven districts participating), one local camp and a State Leadership Camp.

"Camp season is a great example of how Farmers Union, as a grassroots organization led by its membership, can have a positive impact on rural communities," said Doug Sombke, S.D. Farmers Union President.

Now that camp season is over, S.D. Farmers Union gets ready for their school-year youth programming which teaches high school and college age youth about policy and cooperatives and exposes them to the broader picture of American agriculture through tours to D.C., Midwestern cooperatives and the State and National Farmers Union Conventions. Farmers Union also brings leadership programming to several rural school districts throughout South Dakota through its Jr. REAL (Junior Rural Economic and Leadership).

The Jr. REAL program begins this September by inviting the Peterson Farm Bros. to visit students from eight schools including: Wolsey-Wessington, Hitchcock-Tulare, Woonsocket, Wessington Springs, Sanborn Central, Lake Preston, DeSmet and Faulkton.

Made up of Greg (24), Nathan (21), Kendal (18), and honorary "bro" Laura (14) Peterson, the siblings farm together with their parents near Assaria, Kans., and produce entertaining and educational videos on their YouTube channel (ThePetersonFarmBros) and post continuous farming and video updates to their social media pages (Facebook, Twitter and Instagram).

Other Jr. REAL speakers include: Malcomm Chapman, who covers dynamic leadership through his personal experiences as a Marine and Rapid City Councilman; entrepreneur and musician Toby Kane, will bring a pay-it-forward/community service message; "Survivor" cast member, Holly Hoffman, will be the Keynote speaker at Highmore-Harold, Harding County and Miller schools, where she will present her message to never give up.

"We're excited about the leadership and personal development opportunities Jr. REAL provides to many South Dakota rural schools at no cost to the school," says Erin Wilcox, S.D. Farmers Union Rural Development Coordinator.
