Birdless Contest Promotes Flu Education

BROOKINGS — During the 2015 South Dakota State Fair, Sept. 3-7, SDSU Extension will help educate the public on avian influenza, the disease which devastated South Dakota poultry flocks large and small in 2015 and is responsible for cancelled poultry exhibits at this year's fair.

'The State Fair's focus on poultry, in light of this year's show cancellations gives us an excellent opportunity to continue conversations about avian influenza and its impact on South Dakota poultry owners," explained Russ Daly, Professor, SDSU Extension Veterinarian & State Public Health Veterinarian

Daly referenced the fact that Monday, Sept. 7, has been designated as Poultry Party Day, by fair officials. The decision to cancel poultry exhibits during the 2015 South Dakota State Fair was also made by fair officials in May, following advice from the South Dakota Animal Industry Board.

"In light of last spring's outbreaks, keeping flocks home during the fair was a necessary step in helping to prevent further spread of this highly contagious virus," Daly said. "While the spring 2015 outbreaks have subsided, there is considerable worry about a reemergence of the virus in the fall."

Each day of the State Fair at 1 p.m. in the Rabbit and Poultry barn, fairgoers will have the chance to hear an avian flu update, covering poultry health and biosecurity measures that bird owners take to prevent the spread of the virus. The sessions will be led by Daly and Dr. Todd Tedrow, a staff veterinarian with the South Dakota Animal Industry Board.

Although they won't be showing birds from their own flocks, 4-H members will have an opportunity to demonstrate their showmanship skills during a "birdless" showmanship event which will use stuffed chickens, explains Peter Nielson, SDSU Extension 4-H Youth Development Program Director.

'4-H kids and their families are resilient. Their project just doesn't start and stop at the State Fair. It is important that 4-H poultry members are given the opportunity to see what else can be done to support, not only their project, but the entire poultry industry within South Dakota and the region," Nielson said. "Many states have followed suit to work out other avenues rather than live birds, and we felt it was best to do the same. Exhibitors and all of South Dakota should be pleased with the partners that have come to the table to ensure a good
