

## **Bucks Face Explosive Kernels In Home Opener**

Even after a five-overtime victory to start the season, there are things the Yankton football team wants to see improved in week two.

A stronger presence on the ground would be high on that list, said head coach Arlin Likness, whose Bucks host Mitchell tonight (Friday) at 7 p.m.

In last week's marathon win in Brookings, Yankton rushed the ball 37 times for 101 yards – an average of 2.7 yards a carry. A little bit more production on the ground would certainly be a welcome sight for the Bucks.

'The thing I'm still worried about is our ability to run the ball," Likness said. "We're going to come up against decent size with Mitchell, and this is

a game where we need to be able to run the ball.'

In Mitchell's case, the Kernels (0-1) – losers to Harrisburg, 30-7, last weekend - are looking to get anything going in their second game.

They accumulated 176 yards of total offense, but two key turnovers loomed large in the loss. The understandable key is progression, their coach said.

The key for us to take the anticipated steps forward from game one to game two," coach Kent VanOverschelde said.

Any steps forward for the Kernels will likely hinge on the production of senior quarterback Kanin Nelson. The South Dakota State commit passed for 38 yards (with an interception) and rushed for 38 yards last week, but the Bucks know he's certainly more dangerous than that.

And, as Yankton fans would remember, the last time Nelson took the field at Crane-Youngworth (in 2013), he guided the Kernels to a win.

'They've got a running quarterback that can throw, that's why he's going to SDSU," Likness said. "Their tailback (Spencer Neugebauer ) is probably faster than anyone else's, and they've got another guy who's fast on the outside.

"We have to know where they're at at all times.'

The same is true for the Mitchell defense.

Yankton possesses a number of offensive weapons: Quarterback Reid Sawatzke, back from injury, completed 20-of-40 passes for 181 yards and three touchdowns – eight of those completions went to Sheldon Gant. Newcomer Brendon Caskey ran for 61 yards, while Coleton James, Tan-

ner Frick and Blake Savey all caught three passes.

"We feel confident that we can stop those offensive plays," VanOverschelde said. "The big thing is, we have to do it through communication and execution.

"We got a little bit surprised by the speed of Harrisburg, so we'll have to make sure we're ready to adjust."

A year ago, the Bucks rolled past Mitchell 30-2 on the way to an undefeated season. That game, though, is far from any kind of indication for tonight, Likness said.

That game is great experience for them; they have most of those kids back," he said. "But not so much for us because most of those kids were seniors.'

Robbie Neswick is the perfect example of what his coach calls a "golf junkie."

His summer job literally required him to be at a golf course. He could arrive to work early, squeeze in some time on the putting green or even shoot a quick nine holes.

"It got me more motivated for the game," said Neswick, a Sioux City, Iowa, resident and junior at Mount Marty College.

And as Thursday proved, it was time well spent.

Neswick set a new Mount Marty men's golf school record with a round of 70, and the Lancers established a new school record with a team score of 300 at Thursday's first day of the MMC Invite at Fox Run Golf Course.

Not only was Neswick's score four shots better than the previous record, Mount Marty's team score eclipsed the previous mark by 19 strokes.

All that time on the course this summer clearly paid off for Neswick, he joked later. "If I was at a job some-

where else, it'd be harder to get out on the course." Neswick said. "But when I know I can work and play some golf, that's not a bad summer." And for the Lancers, not a bad start to the fall season. Four golfers carded scores in the 70s (which might be another program first), as Neswick was joined by Joe Brinkman (75), Dylan Brende (77) and Luke Loecker (78). Mount Marty's fifth golfer, Collin Matthews, shot an 82. On any other day, that score of 82 would have been
