## Riley: Huskers Need To 'Put To Bed' Loss To BYU

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) — Mike Riley wasn't feeling much better Monday about the stunning way Nebraska lost to BYU in his first game as Cornhuskers coach.

"For me personally, and I probably speak for our staff, those are hard to get over," he said. "It was a bitterly disappointing loss, and it kind of gets worse the next two mornings after, kind of waking up to it and all the different scenarios that pop into your head."

In his mind, Riley could re-play over and over the 42-yard, end-of-the-game touchdown pass that beat the Cornhuskers 33-28. He could imagine a better result for his team if Tanner Mangum hadn't been allowed to roll out to open space and set up for a strong throw, or if one of his defenders hadn't been in the wrong place while trying to cover BYU receiver Mitch Mathews.

But Riley knows dwelling on that single play, and the loss, would be counterproductive with a home game this week against South Alabama serving as a tuneup for next week's trip to Miami.

Riley said he planned to "put that last game to bed a little bit" when he met with his players at practice.

"I sense they have a feeling like I do. It was really disappointing and it didn't have to be like that," he said. "But I don't think we're going to find a lot of guys with their heads down on this deal. I think they're excited because they know they did a lot of good things. That should build up some confidence in what we're capable of doing."

Nebraska will host a South Alabama team that opened with a 33-23 win over Gardner-Webb. The Jaguars' program was started in 2009 and has been playing in the Sun Belt Conference since 2012. South Alabama went 6-6 in the regular season last year and played

in the postseason for the first time, losing to Bowling Green in the Camellia Bowl.

The Huskers will be without two and possibly three players because of injuries. Starting defensive end Jack Gangwish (elbow) could be out three weeks and Co-No. 1 tight end David Sutton (severe ankle sprain) could be out two months. Punter Sam Foltz is week-to-week with a sprain to his left (non-kicking) ankle.

Riley said four of the five players who were suspended for the opener for breaking team rules will be back. One player must sit out one more game. Riley said he wouldn't identify that player until Thursday.

Receiver Brandon Reilly said he senses that his teammates will bounce back from the loss.

"We can only move forward and not let one game affect the rest of the season," he said. "We put a lot of work in the off-season. We can't let one game ruin everything."

"We had turnovers and penalties, so overall we're not where we want to be yet. We've got a little work to do, and we'll fix that next week."

The Coyotes had several missed scoring chances as well, as they failed to convert on two first-quarter field goal attempts, one from 55 yards and the other from the 42.

Kansas State scored its first offensive touchdown about 6 minutes into the second quarter. With 45 yards between them and the end zone, the Wildcats kept the ball on the ground, handing it to Silmon for three straight rushes of 18, 12 and eight yards and then turning to the fullbacks. Gronkowski bullied his way to the two-yard line, and then Dimel battered in for the score that gave Kansas State a 17-0 lead.

The Wildcats scored again with about six minutes left in the first half. After recovering a fumbled punt return by South Dakota, Kansas State took over on the 24-yard line, and Hubener immediately threw a strike to Deante Burton, who

fought off a defender before snagging the ball in the corner of the end zone.

Kansas State is now 22-2 in season openers under Snyder.

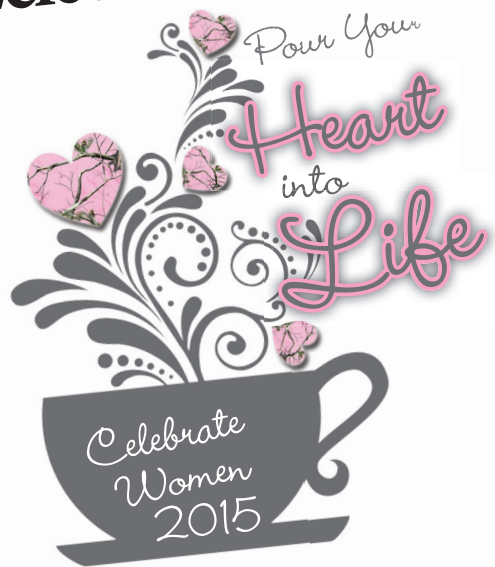
