## SD Attorney General To Give Keynote In Chicago

PIERRE (AP) — Attorney General Marty Jackley will deliver a keynote speech on the role of state attorneys general in policy debates over alcohol at a national conference in Chicago later this week.

The 8th Annual Alcohol Law and Policy Conference is hosted by the Center for Alcohol Policy on Friday. Attendees include such experts as state regulators, attorneys general, legislators, public health leaders, educators and industry official to discuss and debate current law and policies.

Jackley says he intends to highlight the success of South Dakota's 24/7 Sobriety Program in cost-effectively addressing addiction. The program aims to reduce the likelihood for alcohol re-offenses by implementing drug and/or alcohol testing for first-time DUI offenders with a high blood alcohol concentration and repeat DUI offenders.

## New Division Director At Neb DHHS Resigns

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) — A new administrator at the Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services has resigned after a little more than a week on the job.

Yolanda Webb, director of the Developmental Disabilities Division, submitted her resignation Wednesday to Gov. Pete Ricketts. Webb started the job on Aug. 31 at a salary of \$142,500.

Webb, of New Orleans, La., had been the executive director and CEO of the Metropolitan Human Services District, the planning and public policy body for several parishes.

Webb says in her resignation letter that she decided to go in a new direction, but did not elaborate. In a statement, Ricketts says his administration has already started looking for a new division director.

Courtney Miller, a deputy director at DHHS, will serve as the division's acting director.

Wordekemper's position as chaplain has played a crucial part in his donation contribution.

"I have an easy audience," he explained. "I asked for donations at Mass for four Sundays and stood at the door with my bucket at the end so people could drop in donations."

This year's massive haul was also helped by one generous person who told Wordekemper he would match whatever was raised. The person kept his promise.

For Wordekemper, the satisfaction is not in how much he raised, but how it is truly making a difference.

"I know that the problem of domestic violence exists," he said. "It's a silent killer. We talk about people who have survived, but something inside them has died and can't ever be the same. As a Catholic priest, I have to preach God's message of life. By my ability to raise money, I can at least help others to see the light at the end of their tunnels."

Wordekemper has been a top contributor to "Walk A Mile" since he first got involved with it, and has received award certificates every year.

However, the biggest reward is seeing the reactions of the people the money benefits.

"I encounter women and children who have been on the receiving end of domestic violence, and there have been women – students – on the MMC campus who have been victims," Wordekemper said. "I have been stopped on the street by women who have thanked me for walking and raising money. They tell me, 'I am a victim. You have no idea how that (the donations) helps me.'"

While walking in high heels is definitely a struggle, Wordekemper eases the pain by praying for those affected by domestic violence, and thinking of those encounters.

"It convinces me that I need to continue doing this. It does help and it makes a difference in people's lives," said Wordekemper.

information about whether South Dakota is in a teacher shortage. Statistics presented Wednesday showed South Dakota schools covered 99 percent of their needs in the past year but weren't able to offer 240 classes.

Abby Javurek-Humig, director for assessment and accountability in the state Department of Education, delivered three key findings:

One: "Over the course of the next five years, it is estimated that public schools in South Dakota will need an additional 3,059 teachers in order to meet the number of teachers needed to maintain a 14:1 student-teacher ratio. "This number includes a total of 1,024 teachers lost due to retirement; 601 teachers due to estimated student growth; and 1,434 teachers leaving the field for reasons other than retirement."

Two: "(I)t can be estimated that these sources combined will provide a potential teacher pool of 3,459.

"This includes an estimated 1,721 teachers entering the profession through university teacher preparation programs; 1,403 educators prepared out-of-state who come to South Dakota to teach; and 335 teachers who enter the profession through either the Alternative Certification or Teach for America programs."

And three: "The estimated supply of teachers indicates the potential teacher pool will be 400 more than the minimal five-year need."

Erik Person, the Burke school district's superintendent, said the 400 breaks down to 80 per year and that might be inadequate. Not every teacher wants to teach in Sioux Falls and not every teacher wants to teach in Burke, he said.

Jason Dilges, state commissioner of finance and management for the governor, said he wants to know what happened for the immediate past five years. Dilges said the law of supply and demands almost always trumps everything else.

Last month an academic researcher told the task force that teacher shortages in math, science and English have been common through-

out the nation since the 1950s because there is high turnover in the profession.

Rep. G. Mark Mickelson, R-Sioux Falls, reminded members of that point Wednesday. "We're not unique. What we say is unique," he said.

School administrators are using what's known as a plan of intent to cover holes in their staffing. Plans of intent allow teachers to work two years as instructors of courses outside their professional training.

Javurek-Humig said most teachers in South Dakota hold full certifications for everything they are teaching but plans of intent can put teachers "outside their comfort zones." Use of plans of intent is growing, she said.

Plans of intent increased from 548 in 2011 to 643 in 2014 and are expected to reach 758 this school year, she said. The number of teachers on the plans rose during the same period from 315 in 2011 and 300 in 2012 to 329 in 2013 and 373 in 2014.

Armed with data, where the task force might head in its deliberations at the next meeting Oct. 1 isn't clear. Financial information will be brought back, such as estimates of costs and possible sources of tax revenue.

Some members want changes in the state funding formula. Some want efficiency requirements. Some want school boards to face new limits on the amounts of non-obligated cash that they hold. Some want compensation tied to mentoring. Some want property-tax relief. Some want capital-outlay tax levies on property changed.

Don't settle for average, said Aberdeen superintendent Becky Guffin. "We should strive to be extraordinary," she said.

The panel plans a final meeting Oct. 29 before delivering its report to Gov. Dennis Daugaard and the Legislature.

From that document, the governor and lawmakers will decide how to proceed in the 2016 legislative session that opens Jan. 12 and runs through March 29. Two-thirds majorities in the House of Representatives and the Senate would be needed for tax increases.

"I think it's important we admit teachers are underpaid," said Sioux Falls superintendent Brian Maher.
