NMM To Host 9/11-Themed Concert Friday

VERMILLION – Music channels grief, and few instruments convey human anguish as the cello does. The National Music Museum's first NMM Live! concert of this season takes place this Friday, Sept. 11, and honors the historic date with a moving cello tribute.

"September 11, 2001, was a trauma for all of us," says cellist Eric Edberg. "The shock and horror of the collapse of the World Trade Center towers still resonates. In this concert I'm going to play the Bach Suite (the second, in D minor), which to me most expresses that profound sadness."

Edberg is a post-classical musician and a professor of cello at DePauw University in

Indiana. He has played concertos, recitals, and chamber music concerts throughout the country, in Europe, and China. He has been the principal cellist of the Annapolis and Terre Haute symphony orchestras and performs regularly with the DePauw Chamber Players.

The National Music Museum's collection focuses on musical instruments. The Edberg concert will be an opportunity for people to also experience a relatively new and sometimes controversial instrument in the music world: the carbon-fiber cello. Edberg began using a Luis and Clark cello in 2005 when his eighteenth-century Italian cello developed a severe crack—the consequence of ex-

posure to very dry conditions. While his wooden cello underwent a complex, multi-year restoration, Edberg decided that trying out an instrument impervious to humidity and temperature changes made inviting sense. "Luis Legia, of Luis & Clark, had played an Italian cello for decades in the Boston Symphony and had experienced similar frustrations, with the effects of excessive humidity from outdoor summer concerts," explains Edberg. "Legia was an avid sailor and saw how carbon fiber was used in sailboats, which inspired him to work with a sailboat maker to develop a cello and eventually a whole family of carbon-fiber stringed

instruments."

The instrument has also been praised by conductors like Edo De Waart and Bernard Haitink. More and more, the carbon-fiber version is being played by touring cellists, both in classical and other music genres, because of its ease of playing, its dependability, its affordability, and the simple fact that it's much safer to check as baggage than a wood cello.

Among other compositions Edberg will play will be the Suite for Solo Cello by Gaspar Cassadó (Spanish cellist and protégé of Pablo Casals), as well as unique improvisations inspired by interactions with the NMM audience itself.
