Huether: Journey Just As Important As The Battle

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SIOUX FALLS - Mike Huether took the opportunity Wednesday to share a story familiar to most Yankton High School football fans: The plight of quarterback Reid Sawatzke.

It's a story of success. Of setback. Öf recovery. Of perseverance. And of another setback.

An ACL injury to his right knee kept Sawatzke - a football and basketball standout for the Bucks – out of action all of last year. He rehabilitated the knee enough to the point where he could return to the football field, where he took over the quarterback reins for the defending state champion Bucks.

last Friday night's home game with Mitchell after a first-half injury that was later determined to be another ACL tear. It all but ends his high school athletic career.

That determination and drive to return to the field prompted Huether – a Yankton native – to share the story at Wednesday's Presidents Bowl media luncheon in Sioux Falls.

"Like many athletes, he said, 'I'm not going to give up, I'm going to keep training and rehabbing," Huether said told the assembled crowd. "He came back, almost full strength, to compete for the Yankton Bucks.

"He said, 'I want to play football again,' and he did." On the one hand, Sawatzto suffer a season-ending injury, but his situation proved to Huether – as he relayed to the crowd - that athletics play such a key role in a person's life. The message was that the journey is just as important as the battle.

There's a lot of truth to it," Yankton head coach Arlin Likness said, after conducting interviews with Sioux Falls TV stations to preview Saturday's game with Sioux Falls Washington.

"Like people say, what doesn't kill you makes you stronger." It is just a matter of real-

izing that, Huether said. In Sawatzke's case, the potential college recruit was bound for a solid career on the basketball court. And

doesn't mean such an option is off the table, it means Sawatzke will have to turn his determination in another direction.

Likness said he had a conversation Tuesday with Sawatzke in which they talked about the "bigger plan."

"And through sports and through all these injuries, hopefully he'll find something he'll love to do with his life," Likness said. "That's part of growing.'

Sawatzke's situation comes one year after former Yankton football standout Levi Kabella suffered his third career knee injury – he spent the last half of the 2014 football season cheering on

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It was year two at Nebraska.

Tim Miles was about ready to lead his team out on the floor for a nationallytelevised college basketball game at Michigan State.

Television cameras from the Big Ten Network were in the locker room to broadcast live Miles' speech to his Huskers; a potential recruiting boon, he now jokes.

A simple message on the white board was supposed to motivate his Huskers; pump them up for the game.

"There was some smattering of chuckling, because I think we have such a comfort with our team," Miles told a Yankton crowd Wednesday night. "The guys are like, 'Hey coach, nice one.

He turned around to the board. To his embar-

rassment, he had spelled "togetherness" wrong. He had written "Tougherness is greater than frustration."

Nebraska went on to the win the game — which led to T-shirts being printed up with 'Tougherness.' It was Miles' optimism that fueled the moment (and the reason he can joke about it now), but as he said Wednesday night, there is also a life lesson from that light moment.

"In life, you always face frustration, but if you have a unity, your togetherness will overcome any frustration," the Nebraska men's head coach said during the FCA Evening Of Champions event at the Yankton High School theater.

That was a belief the 49-year-old Miles picked up from his days in Doland, a small town — population: 189

BROOKINGS - South Dakota State's blue-and-yellow checkerboard end zones will soon have a surrounding

structure befitting a Division I football program. The Jackrabbits are a year away from transitioning out of the 50-year-old Coughlin-Alumni Stadium and into the new \$65 million Dana J.

Dykhouse Stadium. But even those attending Saturday's home opener against Southern Utah will notice dramatic improve-

ments. What was once considered a state-of-the-art scoreboard has been replaced with a 100-foot by 31-foot high-definition video display board that can show a combination of live video, instant replay, statistical graphics and animations.

The old end zone, with its student section and visitorside bleachers reminiscent of a high school field, has a new concrete seating structure that wraps around half of the stadium, boosting this year's seating capacity to 17,000 and providing fans with their own bathrooms and concessions.

"I think for everybody, there's going to be a bounce in our step," football coach John Stiegelmeier said. "This has a whole different feeling This has a feeling of a true stadium."

The Jackrabbits (1-0) are coming off a 41-38 upset road win over Kansas, the school's first victory against an FBS opponent.

Cam Jones, a senior tight end, said it has been amazing to watch the construction progress and he can't wait to take the field. He expects that the enclosed feel and extra fans will create a loud atmosphere that boosts home-field advantage.

"You'll definitely hear the extra couple thousand people in there," Jones said. "It will have a special feel to it."

The stadium is being funded through \$36 million in bonds to be paid off with stadium revenue, \$19.8 million in private donations, \$7.2 million from the SDSU Foundation and \$2 million from the university.

Other upgrades include a new visitors' locker room and the construction of a large entrance structure surrounding the old home-side grandstand that'll continue throughout the 2015 season.

At the end of the season, the old grandstand will be demolished and replaced with a modernized seating bowl that will boost capacity to about 19,350, according to Jeff Holm, South Dakota State's senior associate athletic director for facilities and operations. Once complete, the school will add community suites, executive suites, loge level boxes and club seats offering access to a large indoor bar and lounge. Artificial turf will replace the natural grass in 2016, too.

School officials estimate that the new digs will boost ticket income from about \$500,000 per season to \$1.6 million while bringing in an additional \$2.3 million from the premium luxury seating options.

Stiegelmeier said the new facilities are already helping with recruiting. "It's been a really easy

sell in terms of the commitment of our administration,"

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
