

River Appreciation Day Held In Clay County

VERMILLION -- Sixth graders from Vermillion, Irene-Wakonda, Centerville and Gayville-Volin areas gathered in Clay County Park this week for a day of celebration and education.

After an introductory program Wednesday morning, the sixth-graders went through seven activity areas focusing on seven distinct experiences in art, science, history and boating.

The students wrote haiku poetry, created images of nature, learned about local birds and animals, experimented with the meandering nature of this section of the Missouri River with hands-on modules in the National Park Service's Stream Table and Mobile Ranger Station, watched how pollution happens in an aquifer, practiced water safety and rescue, and folded and decorated their own handmade origami boats.

Grace Freeman, a Vermillion resident, is one of the founders of the event.

"A long time ago, we lived in Montana and on the river they do this with 4,000 fourth graders over a week," she said. "They set up teepees and there's an educational session. The night before they do it, they do this river appreciation night with community members and they give awards to the people that have been really instrumental in preserving the natural beauty of the river."

So inspired was Freeman by this event that upon returning to Vermillion, she recruited Nancy Carlsen and Cindy Kirkeby to assist in creating a similar event for Vermillion.

'They, in a weak moment, said they would help," Freeman remembered. "It's what it is because of our three different personalities. Nancy does the maps. She does all this layout and organization. Cindy does our spreadsheets and we all divide the phone calling and the connections to help make it all come together."

Many volunteers made the event possible according to Freeman including her husband, Harry, along with several of his students from the University of South Dakota and a few from Vermillion High School.

'We have all these camps and, because Vermillion has such a great artist community, the arts council sponsors these two to come, the poet and the art teacher," Freeman said. "Later, we have the drum group coming. We have the singers with Dr. Wayne Evans. The kids are going to meet back here after they do seven camps and the drum will start. They'll talk a little about the Lakota relationship with the river and they will dance."

USD also was one of the sponsors of the event.

The sixth-graders enjoyed their own relationship with the river by making their own miniature boats.

'This year, we're doing something different with the boat camp where they're making oragami boats that they actually get to take home," Freeman said. "The shape of the boat – the round shape – it makes what the Mandan Sioux call the Bull Boats after the bison bull. They would take the reeds or the willow and make a round shape and cover it with the buffalo hide on the bottom, and they would go down the river on these round boats. So that's what they're making this year.'

A few of the homemade boats will even be used to spread the word about river appreciation, according to Freeman.

'They're going to make two or three big ones and, after the drums perform, we'll be up here with a couple of boats and we'll let those go with our website," she said. "We just started a new website two nights ago. Our hope is that maybe those boats will go downstream to a friendly person that will say, 'Oh, there's a website. Let's tell them where we found this boat,' just to help the

Edward Joseph Pesek was born on October 7, 1918 on the family farm near Scotland, SD, the youngest of three sons, to Joseph and Margaret (Maggie Hack) Pesek. Edward attended Petrick School District #20 through the 8th grade and several years later served on the school board of that District for

many years. Working with his father as a blacksmith, Edward became an experienced welder. This was asset for him when he enlisted in the United States Army at Fort Snelling, MN on February 12, 1942. He took his military training at several camps before being deployed overseas on November 1, 1942. After being stationed in Casablanca, French Morocco, Algiers and Sicily, he was transferred to Italy where he remained until being honorably discharged on September 28, 1945 with the rank of T5. Upon returning to the

States, Edward then worked outside of Bon Homme County. On February 12, 1947, Ådeline (Hejl) and Edward were united in marriage at St. John the Baptist Catholic Church

in Lesterville, SD. They began their farming career on a rented farm near his birthplace. During this time, 3 daughters were born to their union. In 1961, they purchased a farm near Tyndall, SD and farmed there until retiring in 1982 at which they purchased a home in Tyndall, SD. While on the farm, Edward and Adeline raised many hogs, cattle, poultry, and a variety of field crops. After retiring, they did considerable amount of traveling until they were no longer able to due to health issues.

Edward was a member of the American Legion, VFW, Knights of Columbus, and St. Leo's Catholic Church in Tyndall, SD.

Edward passed away on Sunday, September 6, 2015 at the Good Samaritan Society of Tyndall having attained the age of 96 years, 10 months and 30 days.

House Number Must Meet Requirements

The City of Yankton reminds property owners that emergency personnel as well as delivery services depend on address numbers being displayed properly. When doing exterior maintenance chores this summer be sure to check the visibility of your house numbering.

City Ordinance requires all buildings display numbers on the door or front of the structure that are a minimum of 3 inches in height and are visible and legible from the street immediately in front of the building. Numbering on mailboxes, in landscaping or on curbs is not sufficient.
