## Elks Scholarships Are Available

Yankton area high school seniors who plan to further their education after graduation should be aware that Elks National Foundation scholarship applications are now available at [www.elks.org/enf/scholars](http://www.elks.org/enf/scholars).

Steve Pietila, exalted ruler of Yankton Elks Lodge, explains that this year \$3.74 million in college and vocational education scholarships will be awarded through three scholarship programs made available through the Elks National Foundation. Only the federal government provides more money for college and vocational educational scholarships than does the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks.

These three levels include:

- Most Valuable Student scholarships – for high school seniors who are U. S. citizens; deadline for applications is Dec. 4 at the Elks lodge nearest the applicant's home. Yankton Elks Lodge is located at 504 West 27th St., Yankton.

Twenty top Most Valuable Students will each receive \$20,000 plus scholarship awards they had earlier received as result of judging at the local and state level.

- Legacy Awards – for children and grandchildren of dues-paying Elks, deadline for applications is Jan. 29, 2016; and

- Emergency Educational Grants – for children of deceased or totally disabled Elks in the form of renewable, one-year grants of up to \$4,000 a year. Deadline for these applications is Oct. 31, 2015.

Seniors should also be

aware of FastWeb.com a searchable database of millions of scholarships worth billions of dollars. And FinAid.org is an award-winning site including a comprehensive data base of scholarships, advice and tools.

Scholarships.com is a website that allows visitors to browse through 2.7 million free scholarships and grants worth more than \$19 million.

Each year Yankton Elks Lodge selects six scholarship winners, three men and three women, from among local applications submitted to the local lodge from throughout the Yankton area. These winners each receive \$300. Their applications are then submitted to the South Dakota Elks Association scholarship committee for further review for possible state and national scholarship awards.

Last year a student from Verdigre, Nebraska, was selected a local winner and subsequently earned a \$4,000 scholarship from the Elks National Foundation as a result of the state judging process.

Funds for the scholarships are provided through the Elks National Foundation, the philanthropic arm of the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks. Members of the Elks donate to the foundation which never spends the donations but rather invests all donated funds and only the interest earned on the endowment is used to fund activities including scholarships, Hoop Shoot contests for boys and girls 8-13 years of age (360,072 participants in 2015) and Veterans Service projects among others.

## Sunroof Is Having Water Problems

Dear Car Talk:

I have a 2003 Toyota RAV4 with the sports package. Two years ago, there was a water leak in the driver's seat area – a lot of water. After several visits to two different repair places, they found that the sunroof was leaking, and they replaced it. I had no problems until recently. Now when slowing down or turning corners, there is a noise that sounds like water is sloshing around on the rooftop, even though there is nothing on the roof. How can we dry out the roof?

Get ready for another leak, Sharon.

All sunroofs allow water to get into the sunroof well "inside" the roof. And because water inevitably gets in there, there are drains that are supposed to allow the water to flow out onto the ground. Your drains are plugged up – that's why the water is sloshing around right over your head.

When enough of it builds up, you'll

on your way to a wedding that day.

Alternatively, you could ask your mechanic to clean out your sunroof drains. Most cars have four drains. Two go down the A-pillar (at the sides of your windshield), and two go out the back. What we mechanics do is we'll very slowly fill up that well around the sunroof with water. And we'll see what happens. If it doesn't drain out, we know the drains are plugged.

They get plugged over time by outdoor debris – leaves, pollen, dirt, bird

droppings – that gets in there with rain-water, whether or not your sunroof is open. But they're easy to clean out. We just blow them out with compressed air, which works well. Then we'll do a post-op check with some water to verify that they're draining well.

So ask your mechanic to give that a try. And by the way, that might have been what you needed last time, instead of a new sunroof.

Yet, she had a number of Catholic influences in her life. These led her to convert to Catholicism shortly after she had earned her undergraduate degree. Sue has a B.A. in Social Work and Criminal Justice, a M. A. in Educational Psychology and Counseling, and an Ed.S.(Specialist) in Education Administration.

## Semi-Finalists In National Merit Scholarship Program

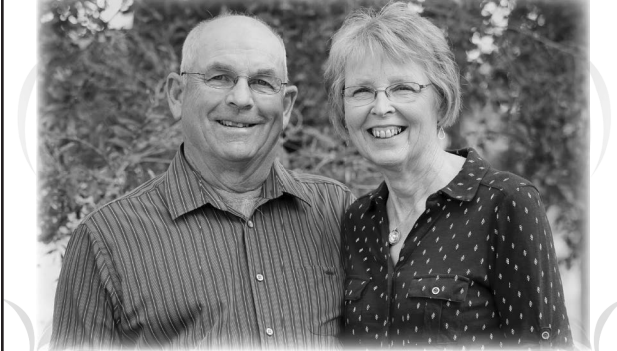

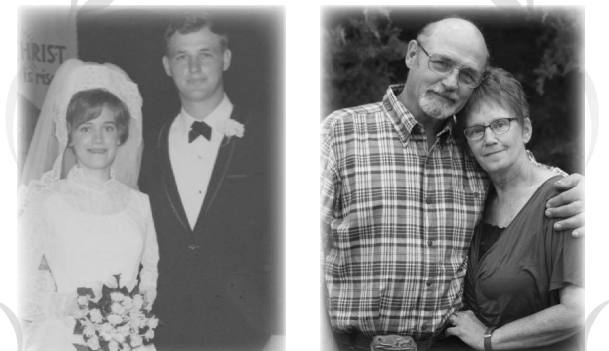

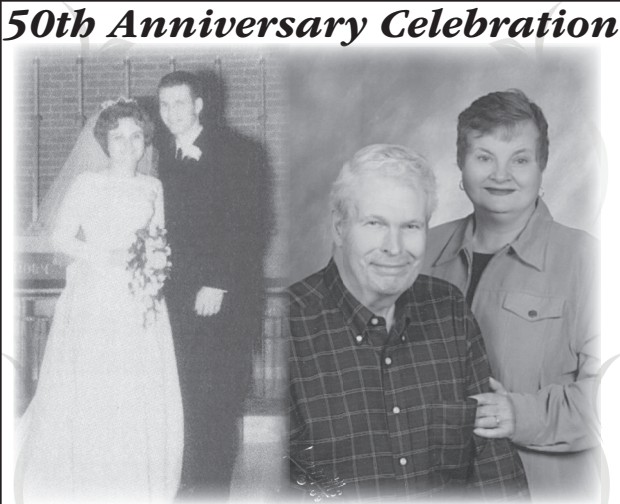
Bruce and Donna Schwarz will celebrate their 45th wedding anniversary on September 19, 2015.
