Office Of Emergency Management Implements New Credentialing System

PIERRE — A new system designed to help officials better identify resources needed for disasters or special events worked successfully in its first two major operations.

South Dakota's Office of Emergency Management (OEM) introduced the Comprehensive Resource Management and Credentialing System (CRMCS) in January.

"The web-based system is designed to identify qualified personnel and equipment needed for a disaster or emergency," says Laurie Morrison, OEM logistics coordinator and project manager for CRMCS. "Organizations enter their personnel into the system including specific qualifications. Each responder receives a plastic ID card with their picture, organization, rank and qualifications all printed on the card and embedded in a barcode. The system also identifies response equipment by size, type and other characteristics."

During an emergency or planned event, incident management personnel scan the barcode for each responder or piece of equipment that enters the incident scene. That gives the incident commander a real-time look at who and what is working the response.

Since Feb. 1, more than 5,200 first responders and city officials, 1,200 different organizations and 1,400 pieces of equipment have been credentialed statewide. The system

was first used for the Delmont tornado in May and then again at the Sturgis Motorcycle Rally in August.

"At Delmont, we had hundreds of volunteers wanting to help with cleanup and with this system, we got the volunteers credentialed and to the right places," Morrison says. "During the Sturgis Rally, the system told us exactly what state government personnel were working in the operations center at any one time."

Morrison says the system is used in the neighboring states of Colorado, Wyoming, Nebraska, Kansas, Oklahoma, Missouri and Iowa. That means local and state public safety officials in those states also can use CRMCS to better coordinate the response to an emergency, she says.

"When a responder with South Dakota credentials is deployed to a tornado in Kansas, for example, Kansas officials know exactly where that responder is from and what his or her qualifications are," Morrison says. The same goes for responders coming to South Dakota from another state that uses CRMCS. We immediately recognize the credential when they check in at the disaster scene, and we can scan the bar code and know exactly what they are qualified to do."

The Office of Emergency Management is part of the South Dakota Department of Public Safety.

Critical Employment Law Issues To Be Covered In Workshops

PIERRE — Proposed new federal overtime rules, data breaches involving private employee information and health care reform are hot issues this summer. Employers can find out what they need to know about these and other critical employment law issues during September workshops sponsored by the South Dakota Retailers Association (SDRA).

"Now, perhaps more than ever before, it is critical for small business employers to understand their rights and responsibilities with respect to labor laws and regulations," said SDRA Executive Director Shawn Lyons. "These workshops are intended as an opportunity to learn and ask essential questions about complex employment issues."

The workshops will be held in Sioux Falls, Pierre and Rapid City, and are designed for business owners, managers, supervisors and Human Resources personnel.

The programs will be presented by employment law attorney Christopher Hoyme. A partner in the Omaha office of the Jackson Lewis, PC labor law firm, and admitted to practice in South Dakota, Hoyme is long time employment counsel to SDRA.

During the workshops, Hoyme will:

- bring employers up to date on a federal proposal to make major changes in who is eligible for overtime pay
- outline vital information every employer needs about the legal obligation to secure electronic employee data
- walk employers through the process of dealing with problem employees, including

things to know and do before terminating an employee and how to conduct a proper employee investigation

- review the top 10 current health care reform issues for employers
- answer questions regarding whether employers have to hire convicted felons, and provide an update on "ban the box" laws and related issues
- explain significant legal developments in South Dakota, such as potential consequences from a workers' compensation legal case, an explanation of the Consumer Price Index (CPI) aspect of the state minimum wage law, and an update on the referendum on the teen minimum wage law

"This is a great opportunity for South Dakota employers of all sizes to 'get up to speed' on recent developments and changes to significant employment laws including health care, wage and hour, workers' compensation and electronic data security," Hoyme stated. "I look forward to providing attendees practical, in-person education and advice during these sessions."

The Employment Law Workshops are scheduled for 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. local time:

- Tuesday, Sept. 22 at the Hilton Garden Inn South in Sioux Falls
- Wednesday, Sept. 23 at View 34 in Pierre
- Thursday, Sept. 24 at Rushmore Plaza Holiday Inn in Rapid City
