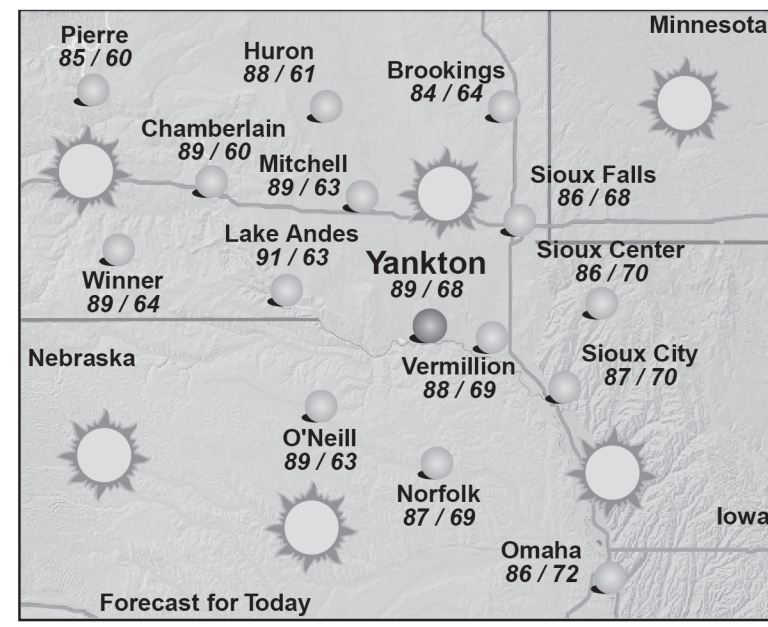

WALL ST. RECAP

U.S. stocks rose sharply on Tuesday, a day before the start of a crucial Federal Reserve meeting. Policymakers at the U.S. central bank will convene a two-day meeting on Wednesday and may decide to raise interest rates for the first time in close to a decade. The gains were led by industrial stocks.

ON TUESDAY:

The Dow Jones industrial average rose 228.89 points, or 1.4 percent, to 16,599.85.

The Standard & Poor's 500 index gained 25.06 points, or 1.3 percent, to close at 1,978.09.

The Nasdaq composite climbed 54.76 points, or 1.1 percent, to 4,860.52.

Beef was lower and pork was higher on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. December live cattle was off 1 cent to \$1.4217 a pound; October feeder cattle fell 2.05 cents to \$1.9275 a pound; while December lean hogs were up 1.60 cents to \$6.385 a pound.

Semi Tractor And Trailer Damaged In Fire

A semi tractor and its trailer hauling 26 tons of gravel were damaged in a fire on the Utica road northwest of Yankton Tuesday morning. Yankton firefighters were summoned at about 6:30 a.m. to the blaze, located about a quarter-mile north of the Highway 50 intersection. An axle on the tractor caught fire and spread to the front portion of the trailer. The fire was confined to those areas, but the tractor sustained considerable damage to the frame and is considered a total loss, according to the Yankton Fire Department. The trailer was also damaged.

Portions of the road were closed to traffic for 30 minutes while the blaze was contained, and then the traffic flowed intermittently throughout the day as crews worked on the vehicle.

The Yankton County Sheriff's Department was also on the scene, as were crews from the Department of Transportation.
