Wheat for December delivery advanced 8 cents to \$4.9475 a bushel; December corn was up 7.25 cents to 3.8450 a bushel; December oats were rose 1.25 cents to 2.3175 a bushel; while November soybeans gained 5.25 cents to \$8.7250 a bushel.
