A Vermillion resident is claiming Yankton County passed him over for a supervisor job at the Yankton County Courthouse without an interview.
Kevin McDonald, a veteran of the Coast Guard, told the Sioux Falls Argus Leader he had applied for a job supervising maintenance and grounds work at the Yankton County Courthouse this summer. Without receiving an interview, McDonald received a letter stating he had not gotten the job. McDonald says this is in violation of laws pertaining to hiring preferences for veterans.
McDonald doesn't plan to take any action, but told the Argus he's concerned about younger veterans.
"I'm an old master chief from the Coast Guard. I'll be OK," he said. "But what about the kids, the younger vets? I want them taken care of and to know that what happened to me wasn't right."
