Gov. Daugaard Proclaims October Archives Month

PIERRE – Gov. Dennis Daugaard has proclaimed October as Archives Month in South Dakota.

“Archival institutions have a responsibility to collect, organize, preserve and make available records that document the history of the state of South Dakota and the Plains region for the education and appreciation of present and future generations,” Gov. Daugaard noted in the proclamation.

“This month is the time for us to focus on the important records that protect our rights, provide enduring memories and give recognition to the people and programs that maintain these records,” said State Archivist Chelle Somsen with the South Dakota State Historical Society at the Cultural Heritage Center in Pierre. “There are county, municipal, university

and private archives as well as the State Archives, and each of these organizations contain historical records that document the rich history of our state.”

The South Dakota State Archives is sponsoring or participating in several events that highlight historical records in October including:

* Saturday, Oct. 10, All Day: Electronic Records Day Oct. 10 is designated as Electronic Records Day by the Council of State Archivists. Electronic files are much more fragile than paper records, and their long-term survival requires attention and planning.

* Monday, Oct. 19, 7 p.m. CDT: Mount Calvary Cemetery Virtual Tour At the Cultural Heritage Center, Ken Stewart will conduct a virtual tour of the cemetery using a PowerPoint presentation while discussing some of the area's early residents who are buried there.

School Board To Review Final Facilities Study Firms

The Yankton School Board has announced the three candidate firms who have been selected to interview for the district's comprehensive facilities study project.

On Tuesday, Sept. 29, at 5:30 p.m., there will be a special meeting during which three remaining candidate companies will present their plans for the project and school board members can ask questions.

The selected firms are DLR Group (Omaha, Nebraska), Koch Hazard Architects (Sioux Falls) and TSP Inc. (Sioux Falls).

The board is expected

to make a decision in the coming months.

There were 14 companies that responded to the Request For Proposal (RFP) put out by the school district in August. Six of those companies turned in the proper paperwork by the deadline and were considered for the job of surveying Yankton School District's facilities.

This assessment will cover Yankton High School/Summit Activities Center, including Williams Field and the surrounding areas, Yankton Middle School and Beadle Elementary. The study will also include Crane-Youngworth Field.

YANKTON COUNTY TAX LEVY OPT-OUT

The new Tax Levy to be voted on next Tuesday leaves out three major considerations. First, the new tax levy does not include a sunset provision. Second, it provides for new construction projects. Third, it does not address the existing roads and bridges budget.

A sunset provision would ensure that this tax levy expires in a set period of time unless the levy is renewed by public vote at the end of the term. This gives the voting public of Yankton County a check against the county commission to guarantee that this levy is still needed, effective, and not being abused. The people of the county need to have more direct control over the spending and levying of taxes by the commission, and a sunset provision is the easiest and most effective way to do so.

The new tax levy has been marketed to the public as a funding source to repair our existing county roads and bridges, but the tax levy, as written, provides for new construction and the ability to assess additional taxes for new projects. This wording needs to be changed to only provide for the repair and maintenance of the existing infrastructure in like-kind or substantially similar infrastructure. For example, a gravel road can only be maintained and re-graveled, or an asphalt road can only be resurfaced or re-asphalted. This tax levy should not have the ability to be used as an ultimate funding source for any new projects. Any new projects such as re-paving an oil road into an all-season road or asphaltting a gravel road should be left to the public to decide on a case-by-case basis.

The way the new tax levy is written does not address the current roads and bridges budget. The new tax levy should state that the general fund contribution cannot be reduced from previous years while the special tax levy is in effect.

For example, say that the designation from the general fund for the past five years was \$3 million a year. The new tax levy will bring in an additional \$1.5 million per year. This would bring the total roads and bridges budget to \$4.5 million per year. A substantial increase that should help accomplish the goal of repairing our dilapidated infrastructure.

Without such a provision what will happen, and what appears to already be happening, based on the commission's current budget proposal is this:

For example, say that the designation from the general fund for the past five years was \$3 million a year. But, since the new tax levy will bring in an additional \$1.5 million per year, the county commission decides to reduce the general fund contribution to say \$2 million, leaving the total roads and bridges budget at \$3.5 million. This would not result in a substantial increase in the roads and bridges budget, and essentially creates a slush fund for the commission disguised as a roads and bridges tax.

In conclusion, the new tax levy lacks three major provisions: a sunset provision, provision for only the repair and maintenance of existing roads, and a provision to maintain the general fund contribution to the current budget. Without these or similar provisions the voters of Yankton County would essentially be handing the county commission a blank check to do with as they please, for as long as they please, with no direct oversight from the public.
